The officials for the twenty-eighth Canadian track and Field Championships which will be held on the A. A. A. grounds, Montreal, on Saturday, Sept. 23rd, have been announced. Dr. H. D. Johnson, city, has been appointed one of the judges at the finish. The championships are open to all registered amateur athletes, and are sixteen in number. Gold medals will be given to the winner, silver medals to competitors who take a second, and bronze medals to the third man in each event. The races will be held under the auspices of the A. A. U. of Canada. Entries will be received up till Monday, Sept. 18. The entrance fee in each event is \$1.

Speaking of the coming Ten Mile Road Race of the Halifax Herald and mail the former says:—This year it is expected that the number of starters will be almost double. This year the Islanders are after more than the gold medal and the big silver cup; they are going to make a desperate effort to land the team prize. The Abegweits have a contingent of speedy runners who are preparing for the Herald and the Mail's race and, perhaps they'll carry off the three best prizes; but not if Nova Scotia and New Brunswick can help it.

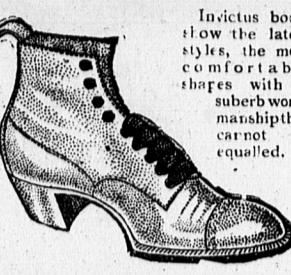
Be sure that your shoes fit you exactly. Shoes that are too large will start corns as quickly as those that are too small. Buy them for comfort, and as the leather stretches put in a hair or cork sole. To relieve corns soak the feet fifteen minutes in warm water softened with ammonia or benzoin. Bind a slice of lemon on the toes, tying it securely with a bandage of soft cloth. If the corn responds naturally to the treatment, it should become so loose after three or four applications that you can push it out by gentle friction.

Rev. J. J. McAskill, St. John, well known here, is engendering some feeling by the strong stand he is taking in the present political campaign. A Fredericton exchange says: Addressing a political meeting here this evening at which Hon. William Fugsley was one of the speakers, Rev. J. J. McAskill, minister of St. Matthew's Presbyterian church, St. John, nearly broke up the proceedings by entering upon a tirade of abuse of Sir William Van Horne, whom he characterized as a "blasphemer, a son of Belial. Great indignation was aroused and the speaker was almost hissed off the platform. He declared that he was fighting for the common people. A St. John exchange has the following:—"The presbytery of St. John at a meeting this afternoon, delivered an effective rebuke to the political activities of its clerical members. Although the name of Rev. J. J. McAskill, was not mentioned, it was generally understood that it was aimed at him. Following is the resolution, "That having in view the highest interests of its congregation and the successful development and carrying on of its work the Presbytery places on record its severest disapproval of any ministers of this church participating as an active party in party politics." An amendment, which censured Mr. McAskill by name failed to find a seconder. The Presbytery preferred to leave the resolution a general one. Meanwhile the members of St. Matthew's church are unable to tell just where they stand. Many of them had expected that he would have had his resignation before the presbytery today, in response to their request sent him ten days ago. It is a situation which finds no parallel in the annals of the Presbyterian church here. The resolution adopted is too general, it is felt, to meet the needs of the case. Some expressed the view that if ministers of other denominations had followed the same course as Mr. McAskill a cry would have been quickly raised against them.
