PETER R. EMERY

HISTORIC OXFORD TO BE HOME OF SILVER FOXES FROM CANADA

LONDON, Dec. 15.—England's first venture in silver fox farming is to get under way shortly, and already 20 pair of foxes have been brought here from Canada and installed on a plot of ground near Oxford.

The 40 animals, which will be used for breeding purposes, are valued at \$40,000. The promoter of the enterprise, a former Canadian army officer believes that the climate of England is ideally suited to the rearing of silver foxes, and hopes to expand his farm to include several hundred foxes within the next year or so.

PEANUTS

The peanuts is not a nut; it is a pea. It is a straggling plant, with thick, angular, pale green, hairy stems an spreading branches, and it ripens its fruit or its peas or its nuts on the ground. Small yellow flowers are born at the joints where the leaves are attached to the stems and as soon as pollination takes place the flower fades and the "peg" as it is commonly

called, buries itself in the ground, where the pod develops. Like many other extensively cultivated plants, the peanut has not been found in a truly wild state and hence it is difficult to fix upon its habitat or place which it would call home. So widely has it been cultivated in eastern countries that some botanists have China to Japan, thence through the attempted to trace its spread from East India Islands to India, and

thence to Africa, where in the Seventeenth Century it was so extensively cultivated and had become such an important article of native food that the slave dealers loaded their vessels with it, using it as food for their cargoes of captives. Some important economic botanists believe that the weight of authority is in favor of accepting the peanut as a native of Brazil, and thus adding the peanut to the

four other plants of high commercial importance which America has contributed to the gariculture of the world—cotton, corn, tobacco and the potato. Before the Civil War the United States imported peanuts from West Africa, and today, notwithstanding the remarkable increase in the production of American peanuts, they are imported from Spain, Africa, China and Japan.

WASHING MILK DISHES

Pitchers, glasses and any other dishes that have contained milk should be rinsed in cold water before being washed in hot water. If hot water is used first it makes the milk adhere to the surface and considerable washing is necessary, especially in the case of glass ware, to make the dishes clean.
