## LOCAL AND PROVINCIAL

### News and Gossip From Town and Country.

THE excavations for the sewer on Water Street will reach a depth of about twenty feet between the Davies and Queen hotels. The work is now being done.

THE GUARDIAN had a pleasant call yesterday from Rev. Matthew Smith, of Annapolis, N. B., a venerable Baptist minister, now past eighty five years of age. He is yet hale and hearty, and has recently spent some weeks visiting relatives and friends in Bedeque and other parts of the Island.

The bride, who was unattended, wore a fawn cheviot travelling costume with hat to match. After the ceremony the happy couple left for a tour to the principal American cities. On their return they will reside in Mrs. Lee's house, corner of Canterbury and Duke streets. The bride, who is very popular, received many beautiful and costly presents among them being a gold watch and chain the gift of the groom. The groom has been for sometime in the employ of Messrs Kerr and Robertson as travelling salesman and was suitably remembered on the happy occasion by the members of the firm and his fellow employees. ADJUTANT M. L. Jost, Matron of the Salvation Army Rescue Home, St. John, N. B., is expected here this evening on a short visit to her friends, and will be present and assist in meetings to-morrow, Sunday, at the Salvation Army.

ONLY a few days more and then a trip to the old country, by that admirable guide, Rev. W. H. Warren, of Bedeque. Start from Grace Church at 8 o'clock. Fare there and back only ten cents. This is a new lecture by a late traveller.

Among the Islanders who have attained to lucrative positions in the United States is Mr. J. E. Newsom, of the firm of Holt & Newsom, Boston. Mr. Newsom is a native of Crapaud, and a brother of Mr. Peter Newsom of this city. He went to the United States about eleven years ago and besides the firm's regular produce business, which is an extensive one, he is largely interested in the Eclipse Oil Company of Wheeling, Western Virginia. This company has an authorized capital of \$300,000 and controls a valuable oil lease of 10,000 acres. The directors have expressed their confidence in Mr. Newsom's ability and integrity by electing him to the office of president. He intended leaving this week on an official visit to the oil fields. The company in their prospectus make the following calculations of the wealth to be derived from this industry:—

"To show the value of this territory, which only needs capital to develop it in a wonderful paying property. On a 10,000 acre tract at least 2,000 to 3,000 wells can be drilled, and it is nothing unusual for a well to produce, 1,000 to 1,500 bbls. in this state, and in a few instances 2,400 bbl wells have been found. And while we have just as good opportunities to get 200, 600, 800, 1,000 or 1,500 bbl. per day, yet in order not to over estimate, we shall base our calculations on small wells, and say for instance, we only get 500 wells, which on an average will only produce 50 bbls. each per day, that would make 25,000 bbls. per day, and oil at the time this prospectus is being printed is ruling at \$1.00 per bbl, with the prospect of it steadily advancing to \$1.25 within the next few months, yet we shall in order to guard against any possible decline, base our calculations on 50c per bbl. and 25,000 bbls. at 50c per bbl. is \$12,500 income per day, and since it is customary to dispose of the accumulations of oil every thirty days it would be an income to the company of \$375,000 every thirty days. And even though the Company would be only one-fourth as successful as the above illustrations, it would be an income of \$93,750 every thirty days, which in itself could be an enormous profit on the original investment; and then again, as there is every reason to believe that oil will rule at \$1.25 and over per bbl., and in that event the profits of the Company would be fabulous.

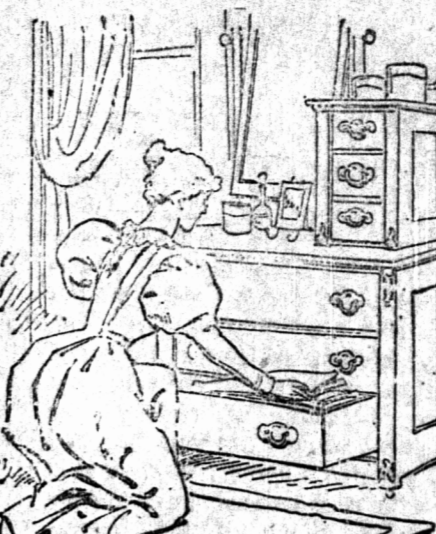
