VALUE OF SEA WEEDS.

D. J. Stewart, of Aitken's Ferry, P. E. Island, has lately been making some inquiry as to the value of sea weed as a fertilizer, and has obtained some information that will be of interest to our readers.

Among users of sea weed there is quite a difference of opinion as to the relative manurial value of different sorts and to settle this question, as between two kinds, Mr. Stewart sent a sample of the long green eel grass, and the short brown old material which had entered upon its process of decay, to Prof. F. T. Shutt, chief chemist of the Experimental Farms, Prof. Shutt reports as follows:

ANALYSIS OF EEL GRASS, 1901.

	Long green	Short brown
Constituents fresh material old	per cent	per cent
Molsture....	74.05	84.81
Total ash constituents...	7.16	4.55
Insoluble ash constituents	.91	1.43
Phosphoric acid.....	.11	.05
Potash.....	.87	.08
Nitrogen.....	.42	.17

It is evident from these figures that the long green, fresh material contains much the larger amount of plant food. The short, brown substance has lost one-half its phosphoric acid, about nine-tenths of its potash, and somewhat more than one-half its nitrogen. It is probable, however, that the small amount of fertilizing material present in the short, brown fragments, is in a more available condition than that in the fresh Eel grass. I presume the latter does not so readily suffer decay in the soil.—Co-operative Farmer.
