### AUTOMOBILES.

Sir.—In your issue of the 10th inst. appears a letter signed D. L. McKinnon in defense of the automobile. Mr. McKinnon begins by telling us that the greatest inventors have been martyrs to public opinion. Well, anarchism, socialism, infidelity, etc., all have their advocates, although they have destroyed many lives, and it is not at all unnatural that the auto should find a few in our island to defend it. He also tells us that you can teach a horse in a few hours to stand by a passing auto. I will admit all this. I myself have often driven horses up to a railroad crossing and they would stand perfectly quiet while a train was passing, but the same horse driven on a street parallel with the railway when seeing or hearing a train approaching would become almost unmanageable. Mr. McKinnon I understand is an undertaker and his business requires him to drive gentle, level-headed horses and when on the road with them he is usually proceeded by a parson and six others and no doubt he feels secure from any danger that may meet him. He must remember that the majority of farmers have young horses to break in every year or two and as they grow older they are sold off, so that the same trouble confronts them from year to year. Nor is the danger to farmers confined to the public roads. Young boys are sent to the fields to harrow, rake, mow, etc., sometimes with a young horse. Let one of those autos come tearing along and the team near the road and we know what the result would be. I have seen a good natured farmer's horse last summer turn on the road and break away from him with a wagon attached. Like the Good Samaritan they took him in for a short way but I have no doubt after parting with him had a good laugh over him. I have also known horses to be frightened away for miles from their owners' premises. Living near cross roads as I do, and in eight of our schools where little children are to be seen at all hours of the day, I must say that I have seen those autos at different times last summer turn the corner at a dangerous rate of speed. We have read letters from Mr. Turner of O'Leary, Mr. Crosby, of Bonshaw, and others who have been doing business with the public all their life, but they have quite a different opinion to Mr. McKinnon. Mr. Turner says he would like to own one and I know that he could well afford to, but having the interest of the public at heart he would deny himself such a luxury. The case of the woman mentioned by Mr. Turner in his letter, who is not injured last summer, and who is not likely to get over it, is enough to rouse the community to action. Let our Legislators pass a prohibitory law, and if they cannot give the Island a total prohibition let us have the running of them confined to Souris, Georgetown, and the other places mentioned by Mr. McKinnon, and I think the people of Queen's and Prince Counties will be quite satisfied.

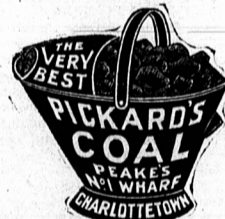
Mr. Brenner thought the pursuers of the rat wearing the badge of disgrace were led by the rat which bore the bell.

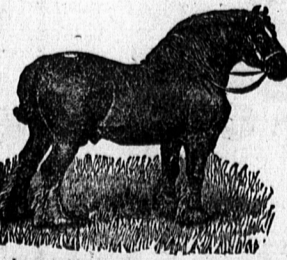
