Leaves Fund in Will For "Ideal Woman"

SYDNEY, AUSTRALIA, Sept. 10.—A wealthy stockman here has recently bequeathed to his wife a fund for the "Ideal Woman." Prizes are to be distributed from time to time.

The conditions for competitors are that they must be unmarried, not over 30, of British descent, and resident in Australia. They must not be the offspring of first cousins. The woman who is to win the prize must be careful and bright in disposition.

She must cut a good figure on horseback, and swim well. She must be intellectually as well as physically well equipped, and she is required to have a wide range of knowledge, including the following subjects: History of the British Empire; geography of Australia; elementary anatomy and physiology; proficiency in first aid; practical housekeeping; domestic economy.

She must also have a thorough understanding of a wide range of English literature including Shakespeare, Carlyle, Dickens, Robert Burns, R. L. Stevenson and others. The woman who is to win the prize must be sound and she must be able to nurse babies and children.

CROP REPORT

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its branches. The Branch Managers have complete and intimate knowledge of each local situation and are in close touch with Crop conditions in all sections of the districts mentioned. GENERAL.

Harvesting is progressing under favourable weather conditions throughout the Prairie Provinces. A good yield with high grade is expected in Alberta. In Saskatchewan and Manitoba rust damage has been extensive and there is a variation of grades and yields. In Quebec the grain crop is expected to yield a fair average. Threshing is well under way in Ontario and the general yield of grains will be good. Apples are fair crop. In New Brunswick the weather has been favourable and prospects are now bright for the potato crop. Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island crops are all going well. In British Columbia the threshing yield is satisfactory, and fruit is now moving out in good condition. Details follow:

PRAIRIE PROVINCES.
EDMONTON DISTRICT—Showers during past week caused some delay but harvesting now in full swing. Prospects promising for good yield.

CALGARY DISTRICT—Ideal harvesting conditions prevail. Indications point to heavy yield. Previous reports of hail and frosts exaggerated to some extent. LETHBRIDGE DISTRICT—Favourable harvest weather prevails. 40 per cent wheat cutting completed. Late crop maturing rapidly. Timothy and second cutting alfalfa proceeding satisfactorily. Threshing now started. Grain shows fair yield and high grade. SASKATOON DISTRICT—Weather conditions favourable and harvesting operations progressing. Wheat cutting will be practically finished in another week. Cutting of coarse grains well under way. Threshing will be general by 10th instant. Good average yield will be anticipated. REGINA DISTRICT—Wheat cutting nearly completed. Threshing commenced and will be general in a few days. Rust damage has been extensive in southeast where yield decidedly below average and grade poor. Other sections will give average returns.

WINNIPEG DISTRICT—Weather favourable for maturing late grains and harvesting operations. Wide variations in yield and grades 60 per cent of new wheat inspected to date reported "Special Rusted" grades, and only 17.4 per cent "Number Three Northern" or better. Coarse grains grading fair.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.—Some damage has been done by recent rains and frost in the Eastern Townships but the grain crop generally promises to be a fair average. Roots doing well. Pasture is good. Tobacco crop is below average.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.—Crops have been benefited by recent rains. Threshing is well under way and the general yield is satisfactory. Fall wheat is turning out well. Barley and will be a fair average yield. Weather condition the past week have been favourable for ensilage corn and roots. The apple crop will be fair. Pasturage has improved.

MARITIME PROVINCES...
New Brunswick.—In the St. John Valley the weather has been favourable for the potato crop and prospects are very bright. In the Northern district both hay and grass pasture are poor, other crops doing well. In the Eastern district crops generally are good. Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.—Weather has been favourable during the past week and all crops are in good condition. Annapolis Valley apples ripening well out but are ten days behind last year.

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.—Threshing is well advanced and yields generally are good especially in Kamloops district. Roots fair. Potato crop promising but acreage below average. Hop picking has begun. Wealthy apples are moving heavily. McIntosh Red variety almost ready. Pears, plums, prunes, and late peaches now moving. All fruits in good condition. The Kootenay district apple crop below average but fruit good size. Pasturage generally good.

Luxurious Liners

(By Dominion News Service)
LONDON, Sept. 10.—The Air Ministry, acting on the recommendation of the Civil Aviation Advisory Board, has set up a Technical and Scientific Investigation Committee to ascertain the most suitable type or types of aircraft engines for the various Imperial aeroplanes services.

Some time ago specifications were drawn up of three such machines, which would be likely to meet the requirements of civil aviation, and the Air Ministry are now asking for tenders for the construction of these machines. Each machine is to be fitted with a British engine or engines and must be capable of being landed on the water without overturning. The machines also are to be provided with metal propellers.

The first of the three will be a single-engine machine to be used on the European transport routes and will have to be capable of a three and a half hours' flight at ninety miles an hour. The second machine, which will be used on Imperial transport routes, will have three engines of not more than 700 horse-power each the object being to secure greatest reliability will carry a crew of four and as many passengers as possible. This machine will be equipped with electric cooking apparatus, and a wireless cabin. It will also have an electric fan, driving air through a screen down which water can be dripped to secure the comfort of the passengers in a hot climate. Collapsible tables and a small ice chest are also included in the equipment, while the machine must be able to climb to 10,000 ft. and carry enough petrol and oil for a flight of 1,300 miles at that altitude at a speed of ninety miles an hour.

The third machine is intended for passenger transport in the Middle East, and while following the last machine in many particulars will have an engine or engines of not more than 1,000 horse-power, a crew of two, and accommodation for not fewer than eight passengers.

These machines, when completed should be air liners far in advance of anything at present in use. They present special difficulties in the way of design, and it is not likely that orders will be placed for their construction for some little time yet.

London Bells Cease to Chime

LONDON, Sept. 10.—Recently the City has missed one of its familiar and beautiful sounds the

melodious chiming of the bells of the clock at the Royal Exchange. These were recast two and a half years ago.

Made in 1845, the clock is said to be out of order, and the bells are waiting to chime again when a new clock, now in the making by a famous firm, is ready.

People have also noticed that the clock of a well-known City church has also been silent of late. The reason is that the vicar and the verger are away on holiday, and the verger, to whom the clock-winder has gone periodically for the key, has taken the article with him.

Organizer of Home And School Club Dead

TORONTO, Sept. 10.—A woman notable in many lines of philanthropic and educational work has just died in the person of Mrs. A. C. Courtice. She was the widow of the late Dr. Courtice, at one time editor of the Christian Guardian. She was elected in 1916 a trustee of the Toronto School Board. During her term she worked for the Welfare of teachers and scholars, emphasizing the need of training boys and girls for citizenship. In 1914 she organized the first Home and School Club, a movement which has grown to be such an important element in community life. Mrs. Courtice also performed great service throughout the country as Provincial Organizer of the Ontario Federation of Home and School Clubs. She founded the Balm Beach College and remained principal and Director of that institution until the time of her death.

On August 21st there gathered together a large number of friends at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Dan McDonald, Glen Valley, for the purpose of extending a welcome to Mrs. McDonald who lately became a bride and a dweller in the district.
