MINCEMEAT COOKIES

1 cup butter
1 cup shortening
1 cup brown sugar
1 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
1/2 cup raisins
1/2 cup chopped nuts

Method: Cream the butter and shortening and then cream together with sugar. Gradually add the flour and beat until the mixture is thick and fluffy. Sift the cream of tartar and salt into the mixture and beat for 10 minutes. Add the raisins and nuts. Roll into balls and flatten slightly. Bake in a moderate oven (375 deg. F.) for about 8 to 10 minutes.

MARRIAGE IS A RISK

Youthful Unions Need Romance Plus Congeniality Base

We had and have been devotedly associated ever since our babyhood with our common background and congeniality. It would not be too bad a bet for us to marry. Certainly it would not be a risk. For couldn't we get along as well for the next fifty years, why?

COMMON TASTES ESSENTIAL

ANSWER: Certainly a marriage that is founded on congeniality rests upon a solid base and the husband and wife who have the same politics and religion and taste in cooking are much more likely to get along peacefully together than those who have not an idea, a taste or a habit in common and who can start a fight at the drop of a hat.
