

Harley To Defend N.B. - P.E.I. Golf Title

(By The Canadian Press) ST. ANDREWS, N. B., June 24—Ralph Harley, Moncton's diminutive linkman who crashed the rolling timepiece last summer by capturing the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island amateur crown in his first tournament, will return next week in an attempt to retain his two-province title.

The little par-shooter from the Moncton Golf Club who upset the tournament favorites last summer with three days of unflinching play, will lead a strong contingent from Moncton, including Moncton club champion Ben Isner.

Shooting consistently in the 70's this year, Harley is reported ready and anxious to defend his honors. Club members, always high in their praise of the N. B. P. E. I. champion, declare he will be a stiff test for the Maritimes' leading shot-makers who will converge on the rolling fairways of the Algonquin Club over the week-end. The three-day tournament will open on Monday and as usual will be a 54-hole test.

Also on hand to defend his honors next week when the fairway firing gets under way will be Archie Skinner, home pro and the professional and open champion of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. New Brunswick's "Mr. Golf," Archie will be favored to retain the title he romped home with last year. A threat on any golf course, the Algonquin putting master long has been close to unbeatable in his own back yard. Last year he jumped into an early lead with a brilliant 66 in the first round and then coasted home.

Determined opposition, however, will be supplied this year for Archie. The leading threats being Don Sinclair of the Riverside Golf and Country Club, Roland Hunt of the Moncton Golf Club and John MacPherson of the Westfield Country Club.

While strong representation is expected from Moncton, Fredericton, Charlottetown and Halifax, entries have been slow in arriving from Saint John and reports indicate that some of the leading shot-makers from the port city will not be on hand for the tournament.

John Steele, power-hitter and ace linkman of the Riverside Club, has indicated that business requirements will not permit him to play in this year's tournament. John was the Saint John club's strongest representative at last year's tournament and went on to become the lowest N. B. - P. E. I. scorer in the Willington Cup matches at Edmonton. Now playing the best golf of his career, he will be greatly missed by the River-

side Club in its quest for the title and also in the team matches. Highlights of this year's tournament will be the final afternoon's play when the six leading amateurs and all the professionals will play their final rounds, and the selection of the Willington Cup team to represent New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island in the Dominion team matches at Quebec City on Aug. 11. These players will remain to take part in the Dominion amateur championship Aug. 11 to 17.

A portent of better things to come in track and field athletics is seen by the release of the big program of sports to be held in Summerside on July 9th next at which students all over the Province will have an opportunity of showing their stuff in the large and varied number of events that have been drawn up.

Sponsored by the Summerside Youth Centre Inc., a body which has been doing a grand job among the youth of Summerside the past several years the meet is expected to draw a record entry list from schools over the Province and as we stated above this coming meet may lead to more and better events of this nature later in the summer season.

The sports boom is also being felt in Kensington. In a recent article a call was issued to all youngsters eager to get into athletics by we suspect, "Big Jim" Pendergast, a man who down through the years has been deeply interested in the welfare of the youth and who in his hey day was an athlete of note. Yanofsky Tied For Top Spot In Chess Tourney

QUEBEC, June 25 (CP)—Abe Yanofsky, 22-year-old Winnipeg entry in the Canadian chess championship who formerly held the Dominion title, moved into tie for the lead with Dr. Joseph Rauch of Montreal after the sixth round today. When he defeated Jules Therien of Quebec in a 19-move king side attack, Dr. Rauch drew with Robert G. Wade of Wellington, New Zealand. Yanofsky, Canada's only chess master, was a strong favorite in the tourney, now near the halfway mark with seven rounds to go. Both Yanofsky and Rauch have five wins and a draw for 5 1/2 points. Following closely in third position was Rea B. Hayes of Kitchener, Ont., with 5 points. Today, he won a 28-move match from Orlan Bain of Quebec after defeating Frank Yerhoff of Regina in a returned fourth round game. Philippe Brunet of Montreal was in fourth position with 4 1/2 points, but he still had to match with the best entries in the competition whose title was left open through the death last year of J.H. Belson of Toronto. Tied in fifth position with 3 1/2 points were Frank Yerhoff, Robert G. Wade of Wellington, New Zealand, and Jules Therien, Yerhoff, however, still has one adjourned game to play.
