THE LION HAS WINGS

The current attraction at the Capitol Theatre, Summerside, is the most talked of British film "The Lion Has Wings." Mosoen lies about 100 miles north of Narvik, evacuated by the Allies Thursday and Friday. From that point to Narvik, another 200 miles north the country is difficult and any attempt by the Germans to advance it would expose them to Allied attacks from the sea—a hazard the Allies, because of their sea power, would not have to face in the event of a push southward.

 BATH, N. B., May 5—(CP)—Gusar F. Gallagher, 68, one of New Brunswick's most prominent potato growers and shippers, died at his home here Saturday after a long illness. He was a member of the Liberal Executive of Carleton County for years.

POPE PRAYS
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Pope Pius prayed to Jesus Christ especially to protect Italy, which he described as "this people and land beloved by you, saved by the blood of your Apostles and of so many martyrs and consecrated by the work of so many of your vicars."

It was the fourth time since his election 14 months ago that the Pontiff had left the Vatican for a ceremonial trip into Rome.

From a throne erected near the Altar in the Church, he looked on while Eugene Cardinal Tisserant, Titular Bishop of the Church, celebrated a Pontifical Mass.

The Pope then delivered his homily, extolling the glories of the Saint who helped pacify the towns of central Italy more than 500 years ago.

Pius said that at this moment the Almighty is turning his gaze toward earth to see if he cannot find a man who mediates on so much ruin and is saddened, who is ready to extend the hand of justice, which brings forth peace.

The Pope invoked the intercession of Italy's patron Saints and continued:

"Jesus, the word, all powerful! King of the centuries, who chose the holy spot where thy Vicar resides, turn thy beneficent eyes on this people and on this land that you cherish, this soil bathed with

It was recalled that long before the withdrawal, Mr. Churchill had spoken of a Norwegian campaign lasting "all summer."

The war office issued a brief bulletin on the fighting in northern Norway, indicating that operations are continuing but that there is for the moment nothing of importance to report.

However, it admitted that there was slight Nazi air activity in the Narvik area.

"There is nothing of importance to report from Narvik where operations are continuing. There has been slight enemy air activity in this area."

uring the services of two distinguished Canadians to take the helm of this important movement," said the Finance Minister.

Mr. Somerville is General Manager and Director of the Mutual Life Assurance Company of Canada; Associate of the Institute of Actuaries of Great Britain; Associate of the Actuarial Society of America; Ontario Vice-President Canadian Chamber of Commerce; and a Past President of the Canadian Life Insurance Officers' Association.

Mr. Beaubien, a consulting Engineer, is Treasurer of the Engineering Institute of Canada, and represents that organization on the executive committee of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, and a director of a number of industrial companies.

"Under Messrs. Somerville and Beaubien a national committee will be organized on a voluntary basis to make the sale of war savings certificates a wide-hearted Canadian effort by a concerted campaign throughout Canada," said Col. Ralston.

"An effort will be made to promote a program of thrift and patriotic savings amongst Canadian children. While this program is designed to supplement wartime bond financing it will provide the purchasers of war savings certificates with a reserve of purchasing power."

Will Aid Canada

"Widespread acceptance of the war savings certificates will be of material assistance in Canada's war effort on the economic front. Organization of provincial divisions of the committee already in progress and the Minister added that further announcement regarding the certificates may be expected in the near future.

While details remain undisclosed in the present scheme it is anticipated war savings certificates will go on sale at something under the face value and at the end of five or 10 years the investor will get back the face value.

ask for during this month. It is not the mere cessation of bombing and bloodshed, the sort of peace that Germany imposed on Czechoslovakia, and that imposed on Finland; it is not the peace that can tear countries apart, as Poland was divided between Hitler and Stalin, but it is a Christian peace in which justice and fraternal charity will triumph.

"From the beginning of the war," says Pope Pius "we have left nothing undone but have championed by every means at our disposal, the restoration of that peace and concord which must be based on justice and trust reach its perfection in mutual, fraternal charity. Our heart is full of sorrow, not only for the terrible calamities that overwhelm the countries at war, but also for the evils every day more menacing, which threaten other nations."

"We have left nothing undone that human power could do and human counsels could suggest, to avert this accumulation of evils. We now place all our hope in Him Who alone is all-powerful. Who holds the world in the palm of His hand, Who guides the destinies of men, and who rules the destinies of these who rule nations. We desire, therefore, that all should interweave

their prayers with Ours, that the merciful God, by His powerful command, may hasten the end of this calamitous storm. And, since as St. Bernard says, 'it is the will of God that we should obtain all through Mary,' we should have recourse to her, as we have recourse to God, for our supplications, our tears, our sorrows, and should seek from Mary our solace and comfort."

"Above all, we desire that during the month of May, white roses of children may flock to the shrines of Our Lady, and through her intercession, may obtain from God, for all peoples and nations, that peace which we strive for. Let the children be assembled every day before the altar of our Heavenly Mother, and on bended knees and with their hands joined, may they offer together their prayers and their flowers, from the mystical garden of the Church."

"We place great faith in the prayers of those 'whose angels in heaven always see the face of My Father,' whose expression always radiates innocence and whose glistening eyes seem to reflect the splendors of heaven. We know that our Divine Redeemer loves them with a special love and that His most Holy Mother has for them a special tenderness. We know that the prayers of the innocent disarm Divine Justice and obtain heavenly graces for themselves and for others."

"Joined in the holy rivalry of prayer let them remember Our Lord's promise, 'Ask and it shall be given to you, seek and you shall find, knock and it shall be opened to you.' May God in His kindness, moved by so many voices, praying together and especially by the voices of children, re-establish men's minds in peace, bind them together in fraternal union and restore the order of tranquility and justice. May the rainbow of peace appear once again and a happier era open for human society."

Surely, dear Brothers, you will hearken to these touching words of our Supreme Shepherd and beloved Father in Christ, and by your piety and devotion during Mary's month will prove worthy children of the Church. In every parish Church,

special devotions will be conducted, if not daily, at least on Wednesday and Sunday evenings. For years past the attendance at the May devotions has been dwindling, but let us have a real revival of this ancient devotion which has been so evidently marked by divine favour in the long history of the Church. As far as possible, parents and children should approach Holy Communion at every Sunday Mass during May, and on some suitable day, a parish ceremony of the crowning of Our Lady's statue is to be observed with fitting hymns, sermon and act of consecration. As we wish to send the Apostolic Delegate a complete report of our share in this universal spiritual campaign for peace, each pastor is requested to send us a report of what was done in his parish, together with an estimate of attendance at the devotions and at Holy Communion.
