**THE CASCAPEDIA.**—The steamer Cascapedia from Montreal arrived in Summerside yesterday morning with a large quantity of freight. After discharging the freight for this port she proceeded to Charlottetown, leaving here about two o'clock. This is the second trip of the above steamer to this port this season.—X.

**STILL SAFE.**—Mr. John D. Murphy, Chief Cook of the C. S. Stanley has received a letter from his son, Pte. Fred Murphy, who went to the front with the First Contingent, dated April 28, which states that he is still safe and sound, although they, the Canadians, had had "a pretty hot time" during the previous week. Private Murphy is attached to No. 1 Field Ambulance and writes from Belgium. He is only 18 years of age and left here with No. IX. Field Ambulance but was drafted into No. 1 at Val Cartier.

**FOR THE CAR FERRY.**—The Amherst News has the following:—The Government dredge, Northumberland, which has been at Picou all winter, has been ordered to Wallace harbor, to do emergency dredging at that port. This dredging is necessary on account of the large order for stone received by the Wallace Free Stone Company from Roger Miller and Sons, contractors for the I. C. R. terminals at Cape Traverse, P. E. I. It is the intention of the company to use their own boats to transport the stone from Wallace to Prince Edward Island, and the dredge is necessary to allow the boats to approach the wharf. The work of dredging will begin at once.



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**THE LOBSTER FISHERMEN** and packers on the North Side of P. E. Island have suffered heavy loss this spring on account of the unprecedented ice conditions along that shore. Mr. A. A. 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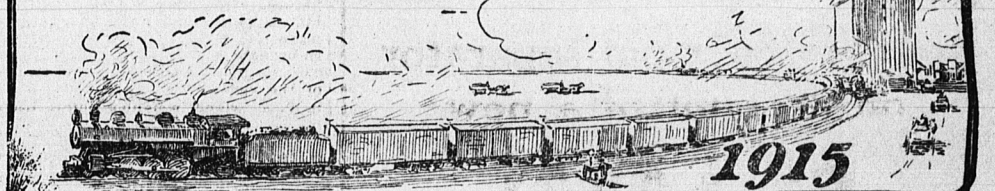
