GARLAND WANTS CANADA TO BE KNOWN AS "THE KINGDOM OF CANADA."

OTTAWA, Feb. 16. — "That in the opinion of this House it is expedient that the title of Canada be changed from Dominion of Canada" is a resolution which E. J. Garland, U. F. A. for Bow River, has given notice he will introduce in the House. Mr. Garland also proposes the resolution "That, in the opinion of this House, it is expedient that the King's title Canada should be massed with the crown colonies, large and small under the British Dominions."

Bretons Can Now Keep Their Costumes

SAINTE MALO, (Brittany), Feb. 16. —There is joy in picturesque Brittany and the pardons and fetes of this old Celtic land, which always have been an attraction for tourists, will be carried out in 1927, as in the past, for the quaint Breton costume which was threatened with extinction has been saved. This has been due to the intervention of five Brittany deputies. They petitioned the Minister of Finance, urging that the application of the de luxe tariff of 13 per cent, instead of the ordinary two per cent, to the silks and ribbons in the aprons and shawls of the Breton costume was unjust because these articles were comprised in the regional dress of the poorest peasant. If the de luxe tariff were insisted on in this case it would force the peasants to abandon their time honored costume.

The Minister of Finance has recognized the justice of the claim and has modified the terms of the decree concerning tax collection so that in future Breton aprons, whatever the price, will be taxed on the 2 per cent, scale only. Breton shawls and scarfs other than those in wool, will be subject to the de luxe tariff only when the price exceeds 60 francs. Woolen shawls of course pay the ordinary tariff of 2 per cent.

Popularity of The Planetarium

BERLIN, Feb. 16. —Six planetaria, which provide astronomy for the masses, and which are described as miracles of highly specialized technique, are now in operation in Germany, the latest with 119 lenses having just been opened in the Zoological Gardens of Berlin. There are three presentations daily: for the general public at 8, 8.30 and 9 p. m. each of an hour's duration. The mornings are reserved for children and students.

So popular have the planetaria become that efforts are being made to have installed an apparatus in London, and it is said that New York is contemplating one for its new American Museum of Natural History.

Leading German astronomers give lectures that are always well attended, and the audience gathered around the small circular hall can watch, after a few moments, the events of heavenly bodies during the 24 hours. The mechanism can be speeded up or reversed, and it is possible to demonstrate such interesting phenomena as the looped character of certain of the planetary orbits, the procession of the equinoxes and the celestial configuration of the past, present, and future, while an ingenious enumerating device enables the respective dates of the various configurations to be read off at will. "The Midnight Sun," "From Pole to Pole," "The Year in a few Moments," "Eternal Spring" are a few of the titles chosen from lectures offering infinite possibilities.

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DAWES PLAN DOES NOT PREVENT IMPROVED RAILWAY ACCOMMODATIONS IN GERMANY

BERLIN, Feb. 16. — Travel in Germany, already noted for comfort, is to be made more comfortable and attractive.

The German Railway Company will put into service on the Berlin-Copenhagen route early in the New Year three new passenger coaches of a type to be introduced in the whole system as rapidly as conditions will permit.

In point of comfort and artistic beauty these new cars offer striking testimony to the manner in which the company has overcome the tremendous burdens placed on it by the Dawes plan and by difficult business and industrial conditions. The compartments are finished in the finest mahogany and American bird's-eye maple, bevelled mirrors and artistic pictures adorn the walls, and the lighting and ventilation are exemplary.

Another new departure which will prove popular has been introduced by the "Mitropa," the company that operates the sleeping and dining cars. This is a "kitchen car," to be run on routes having no dining car. Two compartments at the end of a third-class wagon have been equipped as kitchen and pantry. Cold dishes and simple warm dishes will be served in the compartments on small folding tables.

EDISON'S CONCEPTION OF IMMORTALITY

WEST ORANGE, N. J., Feb. 16. — Thomas A. Edison today gave an interview here, his conception of life and of death.

"Man is not the unit of life," he said. "He is as dead as granite. The unit consists of swarms of brilliant, of highly organized entities which live in the cells.

"I believe at times when a man dies, this swarm deserts the body, goes out into space, but keeps on and enters another cycle of life and is immortal."

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
