The next item on the agenda was the election of officers which resulted as follows: President, F.G. It was moved by F.G. MacIntyre, seconded by Carl Stewart that Mr. Joseph MacIntyre be appointed a life-time honorary member. Mr. MacGregor has been a member of the Montague Curling Club since its beginning.

Mr. Walter M. Bears made the very generous offer of a trophy to the club to be played for by the junior curlers of one and two years standing, but in case of inconvenience the time limit might be extended to more senior members at the discretion of the executive. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Bears for his most generous offer.

A lengthy discussion centered around the acquisition of an adequate water supply for making ice. At present the water is now being supplied by the school, but the club felt that it should possess its own water supply and a provision should be made at present to have such a supply in a short time. Mr. A.E. Sullivan was selected to look further into the question and present his findings at the next meeting.

It was moved and seconded that the dues of the last year would again be in force this year, and that all who wished to apply for membership should be admitted on meeting the regulations.

Some discussion took place with regard to choosing colors for the club which, at present has no colors. Mr. Keir Clark, A.E. Sullivan, and Hewson Kydd were selected to look into the question of club colors, and to present their findings at the next meeting.

With the completion of the business the meeting adjourned.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

The following is the report given by the President: Gentlemen: A year ago you honoured me in my election to the office of president of this club, and now, at another annual meeting, I give to you this brief presidential report. In the year's accomplishment I claim no personal credit, but I think that, in all the years I have been a successful one. While it was regretful that quite a number of former members did not continue their membership, their numbers were made up by some seventeen new members who for the most part, took a very active interest in the work of the club.

While the financial report does not show a large surplus, I think it is a healthy one considering the purchases and payments made. Through our good friend, Mr. Clark, we procured from War Assets sufficient new hose to meet the requirements of flooding. This

club room ceiling, which was not insulated when the building was built, was this year insulated and should insure a great heat conservation. New double windows between the rink and the club room have been procured and when put in place should not only conserve heat, but should also provide a better view of curling events by the elimination of moisture condensation on the glass.

The intra-mural or spiel competitions were keenly contested. The Keir Clark chocolates were won by a rink skipped by Dr. L.A. Johnston. The Tip Top Trophy was won by a rink skipped by A.G. Parks. The Fred McIntyre strawberries were won by the A.G. Parks rink skipped in the final game by William MacLean, while the Clarkson Shield was won by a rink skipped by George Gordon. As to junior curling, more interest was shown than ever before, not less than five teams contested for the right to play for the Island Junior championship and the Regal Flour Trophy.

While the success of the club in Bonspiel competition was not marked, much interest was shown and good times were had. Three teams skipped by H.L. MacGregor, A.G. Parks, and Bruce MacLean, respectively, took part in the Gaboury competition on January 28th at Charlottetown which was won this year by the Summerside rink. The club was represented at the Confederation Bonspiel by three rinks skipped by Dr. L.A. Johnston, George Gordon and R.W. Beck respectively. Rinks were entered in the Consols playdowns, but failed to enter the finals wherein a Charlottetown club rink skipped by Frank Acorn carried off the Tankard, while R.S.P. Jardine's rink was declared runner-up. The club is to be congratulated in successfully defending its right to retain the McArthur cup which is the only inter-club cup now retained. By reason of the fact that our club was the 1946 winner of the Regal Flour cup emblematic of the Island Junior championship, it was this year host to the rinks competing for the same in the 1947 competition which took place on March 1st last. All four Island clubs were represented in play-downs which finally ended about 4 o'clock in the morning of March 2nd with Alberton winning the cup, which I, as a vice-president of the Island curling club, presented to them. The Montague club was represented by a rink skipped by Douglas MacLaren.

I wish to express my appreciation to the club members as a whole for their loyal co-operation during the year closed, and in a special way I wish to draw attention to the very fine and efficient work of our secretary, Mr. Don Samson, with whom it was a pleasure to work. I wish to thank for their fine co-operation, George MacIntyre, and his building committee, L.H. Poole and his entertainment committee, Carl Stewart and his membership committee, A.G. Parks and his games committee (other than myself), and A.E. Sullivan and his ice committee. I wish to thank also the efficient janitor, George W. Preece, gave us ice to curl on which could not be surpassed in any rink in Canada. My thanks are also due to the staff of the club, and to the printing facilities for making up game schedules for distribution among the members.

In any pleasure, to attend to the usual routine of the club, I wish to thank the members of the Island Curling Association which was held at Charlottetown on Nov. 5th, inst. Our representatives on the Island executive for the ensuing year are L.H. Poole and Dr. L.A. Johnston together with the president of the club to be elected at this meeting.

It was reported at the annual meeting that, in addition to the Regal Flour Junior playdowns, it was planned to hold a Maritime Junior competition in which members with up to eight years standing would be eligible. While final details have not yet been completed, it is understood that in the finals each Maritime province will be represented by two rinks playing a scheduled number of games with total points to count in declaring the winner.

The following dates were fixed for the Island play-downs respectively: The Gaboury cup competition at Charlottetown on January 28th, 1948; the Confederation Bonspiel, and British Consols playdowns at Charlottetown on February 9th, 1948; the Regal Flour competition at Alberton on February 4th, 1948; and the newly established physical fitness playdowns at Charlottetown on February 25th, 1948.

In conclusion I wish to bespeak from you on behalf of my successors the whole-hearted co-operation which you have so generously given me.
