**WETTER WOOLLENS**  
It is a surprise to many people to learn that it takes at least fifteen minutes to make a wool fabric completely wet in clear water at an ordinary temperature. Soap is a "wetting" as well as a cleansing agent, and the more efficient the suds, the less time it takes to get the fabric thoroughly wet. Some brands are effective only at high temperatures which are dangerous for silks and woolens. Thus it is wise to choose the brand which forms thick suds in lukewarm water and will not harm anything safe in water alone.

### APPLIANCES REVEAL DEFECTS IN WIRING

A well-planned and adequate wiring system helps protect the home owner against poor service from his appliances. Inadequate wiring systems may be replaced with the aid of funds obtained from qualified lending institutions. There are many systems of an inadequate wiring system. Among them are:  
Hesitation of heating appliances to come up to the proper temperature.  
Dimming of lights when heavy current-consuming appliances are turned on. Necessity of frequent replacement of fuses or readjustment of circuit breakers.

### SHORTER HAIR IS FALL STYLE

Women will be "hair-minded" when they choose their hats for this fall. The majority of the most attractive autumn chapeaux never meant to be worn with a long bob. That is, a long bob which hangs straight down all the way around.  
To wear with an off-the-face hat—Y-shaped at the front—creates a coiffure that makes use of long hair which has a trimmer look than the erstwhile pageboy or "glamour" bob. The long ends at the back are fastened at the nape of the neck with a clip. Sides are upwards. And there are short, softly-curved bangs at the front. They fall in the V line of the hat.  
With a beret which covers the back of the head is shown a smart, short coiffure which follows closely the lines of the head and is neat and trim without being mannish.

**Hair Is Shorter**  
Shorter hair is, of course, the order of the day. All coiffure experts report that their chic young customers, as well as their stately-groomed, more mature customers, are demanding that the scissors be used freely. Salons are specializing in smoothly-tapered effects; in that, that is, no more than three inches long all over the head; in special permanent waves which give shorter locks the body they require.  
Unkept coiffures are few and far between. Only those to whom upwepts are truly becoming seem to continue to cling to them. Nobody is stretching a point, saying "It'll get used to it" and trying to persuade herself that the upwept is flattering when it isn't.  
Experts predict that hair will get shorter and shorter, as it has in England ever since women became busy with defence work. However, they maintain that the so-called mannish bob with shingled back won't appear again—ever.  
It always spoiled the nice line across the back of the neck and, of course, did less than nothing to soften the jawline.  
With deep-crowned hats with swashbuckling, upturned brims short hair styles with softness at the sides are interesting. With the peaked cloche, worn slightly back on the head, curly bangs and medium-size pompadour rolls vie for favour with sleek brushed-back front sections. Unless you are a raving beauty, bangs are probably more suitable than severe lines, however sleek.  
Whatever hair style you choose for fall, remember that no coiffure can be lovelier than the quality of the hair from which it is arranged. Dull, lifeless-looking locks cannot be arranged in beautiful swirls and curls. It takes hair that is gleaming with health—due to a sensible diet, fresh air and nightly use of the hair brush—to make an outstanding coiffure that remains outstanding looking for more than 12 hours.

## Dorothy Dix Says—

### TOO LITTLE INTELLIGENCE IS USED IN MOST FAMILIES

**Studying Causes Of Friction And Then Eliminating Them Would Bring Much More Peace And Happiness To All**

One of the most curious things in life is how little intelligence we use in solving our domestic problems. About other things we use our brains. If we are doctors, we try to diagnose the trouble and find a remedy for it. If we are lawyers, we study a case until we find a clue to the snarl in which our clients have got themselves and can show them a way to straighten it out. If we have a shop, we bend all our energies toward making ourselves popular with those with whom we must deal. But when it comes to dealing with our own families, we act like perfect morons although our happiness, our comfort and even our prosperity depends upon getting along amicably with those with whom we are brought in daily and hourly contact. We don't take the trouble to try to understand them and why they act the way they do. Still less do we attempt to find a way to clear them. We don't even bother to remove from our pathway the stumbling block over which we bark our shins every time we move. We just go on enduring. Grandpa's cantankerousness and Aunt Letty's peculiarities, and eating the things we don't like, and listening to the same squabbles, and being sore over it all without doing a thing about it, though the cure is right at our hands if only we had the sense to use it.
