MAILS FOR YUKON—WINTER SERVICE—The Post Office Department has issued notices that the season of closed navigation on the Yukon River extends approximately from the 1st of October to the 31st May, and that during such period parcel post to the Yukon will be suspended, except for the post offices of Champagne, Carcross and White Horse. Postmasters are not allowed to accept parcels for other places in the Yukon between the dates above named.

Gorilla Man Kills 13 Wives

Vienna, Sept. 10.—Bela Kiss, Hungarian bluebeard, who murdered 13 of his 'wives' before the war and outwitted the police of Europe for 20 years, has been discovered in the Rumanian prison of Arad, where he was serving a life sentence for another criminal in order to escape the gallows. This arch scoundrel's terrible career recalls the adventures of Landru, the French woman murderer, whom Kiss resembled somewhat in appearance and in his method of disposing of his victims' bodies.

This fantastic tale begins more than twenty years ago in the Hungarian village of Elnokota, near Budapest, where a dwarfed, bearded, gorilla-like man named Kiss excited the interest and envy of his neighbors by his astonishing success with women.

Every month a fresh female face would be seen at the window of the villa, where he lived and loved, but but when asked how he managed to change his sweethearts so often, he would mutter something to the effect that women "are difficult to get on with and rid of." "Also that the madonnas of the village "have all gone to the same place."

Nothing was suspected until the mystery man sold his house and disappeared. The following year, the new owner of the villa, who had decided to rebuild it, discovered in the foundations, deep down in the earth thirteen iron chests, all securely locked.

The police were summoned and when the chests were opened, it was revealed that they contained the bodies of thirteen brutally murdered young women. An extensive search for the slayer throughout Europe was immediately started and continued for years. Indeed it was not until it was falsely reported that Kiss had died in Africa from malaria while serving under an assumed name in the French Foreign Legion that the man hunt began to dwindle.

Now, however it has been definitely proved that a certain inmate of the Rumanian prison of Arad stole the identity papers of a notorious robber chieftain named Franz Wimmer and cheerfully assumed responsibility for his crimes in order to escape the fate he knew would be his were his real identity to become known.
