## Cornwall United Church Reopened

After being closed for several weeks for the purpose of undergoing extensive repairing and redecorating, the United Church at Cornwall was re-opened on Sunday, September 16th. The Young People's Group assumed as part of their project for the past year financial responsibility for the entire redecorating of the interior of their church, and set themselves with such zeal and enthusiasm that they were able to thoroughly carry out their project. The congregation cooperating with the young people undertook to redecorate the exterior, with the result that the Church both exterior and interior presented a very attractive and beautiful appearance for the re-opening service, showing the latest in church decorating.

The service began at 9 p.m. with the church packed to capacity including the adjoining school-room. The pastor Rev. E. M. Aitken, B. A., was assisted by Rev. H. D. Raymond, M. A., of St. Paul's Church, Charlottetown, and Rev. MacLeod, M. A., also of Charlottetown. An interesting and pleasing feature of the service was the unveiling of an exceptionally beautiful memorial presented to the church by Miss Sarah Kellow in loving memory of her father, Mr. Samuel Howard. It consisted of the set of three pulpit chairs, a pedestal and a Communion table of the highest grade of furniture, and to match the pulpit which had been given some years before in memory of Mr. Samuel Howard. While the congregation stood the gift was unveiled and dedicated by the pastor assisted by Rev. Mr. MacLeod. A very appropriate and impressive sermon was preached by Rev. ## QUANTITIES OF NEW ZEALAND BUTTER AND CHEESE GRAD-

The figures of the Dairy Division of the Department of Agriculture show that the salted butter graded for March, 1926, was 6,175 tons, a total of 339 tons, compared with 6,142 tons salted and 672 tons unsalted, a total of 6,814 tons for March, 1925, a decrease of 6.9 per cent. For the eight months ended March, 1926, the respective quantities were 52,318 tons salted and 2,727 tons unsalted, a total of 55,045 tons, compared with 58,294 tons salted and 4,006 tons unsalted, a total of 62,300 tons for the corresponding period of the preceding season, a decrease of 12.5 per cent.

The cheese graded for March, 1926, comprised 5,816 tons, white, 3,310 tons colored, a total of 9,126 tons, compared with 5,307 tons white, 2,521 tons colored, a total of 7,828 tons for March, 1925, an increase of 16.5 per cent. The quantities for the eight months ended March, 1926, were 39,608 tons white, 22,225 tons colored, a total of 61,833 tons, compared with 38,255 tons white, 20,070 tons colored, a total of 58,325 tons for the corresponding period of the preceding season, an increase of 6.3 per cent.

Converting these figures into butter-fat equivalent, there is a decrease of 6.9 per cent. in butter-fat production for the eight months ending March, 1926, compared with the corresponding period of 1924-25. Stocks held in the various grading plants at the 31st of March, 1926, were: Butter, 11,129 tons; cheese, 13,635 tons.
