Trading Pace Steps Up On N. Y. Stock Exchange

NEW YORK, July 11—(AP)—Wall Street's bull market put on a little more weight last week and grew a little trickier despite the summer heat.

For the second week in a row the general price level rumbled into the highest price ground since August 1946. Railroad stocks, on the average, were at a peak since July that year.

Trading volume picked up as buying interest expanded and on Thursday total sales reached the 1,000,000 share mark for the first time in 10 days. On Friday, when prices rolled ahead still faster, sales volume picked up accordingly.

Motive power for the rising market was generated by the railroad group. Considerable buying power spilled over into the industrial sector, steels in particular, but it was noteworthy that industrial stocks on the whole have not yet matched their 1948 highs.

Rail and oil stocks have struggled for leadership of the market for months but in recent weeks the rails have pretty much had it their own way.

From a long-range viewpoint, the financial district was pretty well satisfied with the decisive way in which Gen. Eisenhower removed himself from consideration as a possible candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Wall Street still has two black clouds on its horizon: the situation in Berlin and the refusal of miners to work in the soft coal mines owned by the steel companies.

The Associated Press composite of 38 wholesale commodity prices registered its third successive Friday-to-Friday decline last week, despite advances in all its components except grains and cotton and non-ferrous metals.

The index, in which the base year 1926 equals 100, stood Friday at 189.81; compared with 189.79 a week earlier. A year ago the figure was 179.10. Livestock hit a 1948 high at 268.07, and others advancing were industrials, food and textiles.

Discusses Management Of The Farm Wood-Lot

Following is the text of an address given by Mr. Norman Black, supervisor of P. E. Island Illustration Farms, at a meeting last week of the Maritime section of the Canadian Society of Forest Engineers:

"The farm woodlots of Prince Edward Island not only serve as sources of fuel and building material but play a vital role in controlling the water supply in the soil, controlling the flow of streams and protecting the soil from erosion and drifting.

"The woodlot is an inseparable part of the farm, and studies in land use and farm economics have shown how indispensable well managed woodlots are to the average farm enterprise.

"The first requirement of the woodlot should satisfy is that of supplying the needs of the farm itself for fuel-wood, fencing and occasional lumber for construction. When no woodlot exists, all lumber for farm maintenance must be bought; cash must be paid for material to replace rotted fencing, a broken tool handle, wagon-pole, single-tree, etc. Under such circumstances these necessities are generally replaced only in part, resulting in a gradual but steady deterioration. Sales of timber from woodlots that are large enough to yield a surplus over farm requirements form a useful source of revenue.

Program Expanded

"Observing the rapid depletion of farm woodlots over a period of years and recognizing their role as an inseparable unit in the general farm enterprise, the Division of Illustration Stations expanded its program in 1944. In co-operation with the Dominion Forest Service, three managed woodlots were established to demonstrate selective cutting and methods whereby growth may be increased and tree quality improved.

"A preliminary survey of woodlots was conducted by the Forest Service at Illustration Stations operated by J. W. MacKenzie, Rose Valley, John L. Clark, M.B.E., Rustico, and James E. Daly, Iona, and working plans drawn up for those areas found suitable for management studies.

"The working plan for each individual woodlot comprises a number of compartments carefully blazed, and varying in area from two to four acres. The owner must insure that the respective compartments are protected from damage by livestock. One of the initial undertakings of the Forest Service is to prepare a detailed description of the growing stock, listing all tree species in the stand and reviewing their past history. A forester next spot marks all trees to be cut. Such trees include defective and dead species, unprofitable types, diseased trees and those having reached maturity.

"Compartments are spot painted annually, and it is the duty of the Illustration Station operator to cut the trees as marked and remove them from the stand.

"The general administration of the woodlot comprises the establishment of suitable roads, slash disposal, guarding against grazing, fire insects and disease. Tabulation of necessary records is the responsibility of the operators. These records include date of cutting, number of cords of fuel-wood, pulpwood and board feet of sawlogs removed and their valuation.

"When selective cutting has been completed in the last compartment of the woodlot a crop is again harvested from number one compartment.

Reforested

"Reforestation measures have further been pursued in connection with land utilization and forestry studies. Through the courtesy of the Provincial Government of Prince Edward Island, 11,300 red pine, 500 Scotch pine, 1,850 white cedar and 4,000 ash have been made available for planting on Illustration Stations since 1945. Unproductive slopes, cropped out fields and clear cut woodland areas have been reforested with the view of rendering them productive in future years.

"While studies associated with farm woodlot management have not progressed sufficiently to evaluate the enterprise from a monetary standpoint observations indicate a decided increase in the growth of trees where thinning operations have been completed. The removal of the mature trees, windfalls and dead trees, wolf trees and other undesirable gives rise to a vigorous growing, disease free stand.

"Following the instructions of the Dominion Forest Service, the operator at Rustico removed 12 cords of firewood and 600 board feet of lumber from compartment 1 in 1945; 12 cords of firewood and 800 board feet of lumber from compartment 2 in 1946 and 15 cords of firewood, 1,826 board feet of lumber and 2 1-2 thousand of shingles from compartment 3 in 1947.

"At the Rose Valley Station, compartment 1 yielded 12 cords of firewood in 1946, while compartment 6 yielded 10 cords of firewood in 1947.

"Thinning operations at the Iona Station resulted in the removal of 12 cords of firewood from compartment 1 in 1946 and 23 cords of firewood, 1,826 board feet of lumber and 2 1-2 thousand of shingles from compartment 3 in 1947.
