THE VICIOUS CIRCLE

There is much to think about in the letter of "Spud Islander," elsewhere in this issue and there are many things yet to think about before the problems at present confronting us are solved.

Two things have evolved; first he needs much more than he needed twenty or thirty years ago. He lives in a better furnished home; he and his family dress more expensively...

This is part of the cause of the narrowness of the margin. Another cause is the higher cost of the article he is obliged to buy. A farm implement of any kind costs from twice to three times as much as it did twenty or thirty years ago.

This is only a part of the vicious circle. In our dilemma we have opened our markets to foreign competitors in the childlike belief that it will reduce the cost of living...

The Poincare cabinet was unexpectedly defeated in the general election and will resign in due time to take effect on June 1st.

Poincare's aggressive policy in occupying the Ruhr and seizing upon its administration had naturally aroused bitter resentment in Germany and had met with little favor in England.

Premier Poincare and the British Prime Minister, Ramsay MacDonald were to have met in conference on Monday next to consider what action would be advisable to take with regard to the Dawes report...

A cable despatch of a few days ago told that the British and French governments had come to an agreement with regard to the long projected railway tunnel under the English Channel.

Much stress has been laid by the Liberal press on the partial endorsement of the Robb budget by the Massey Harris Company which is largely engaged in producing agricultural implements.

What other manufacturers and their workers think of the loss of protection is told by three or four Liberal members of Parliament and at least one Progressive who have announced their intention of voting against the Robb tariff changes.

A WORD TO AUTO OWNERS

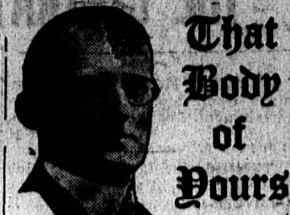
Sir—All persons I understand can run a car only by paying license and having the number placed on his car, and in the proper place.
