Daily Call, Leadville, S. Dakota. Announcement was made today of the sale of the Searle meat market, by Mrs. Grace J. Searle, widow of the late Charles J. Searle to E. S. Stanley, of Lead. Mr. Stanley took possession of the store today.

The market will continue to be known as the Searle market, and the name will not be changed, Mr. Stanley said. Established more than 50 years ago, the market was a pioneer in Lead and is the oldest here.
