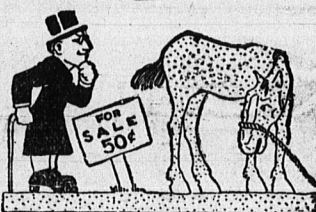

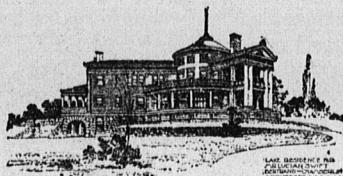

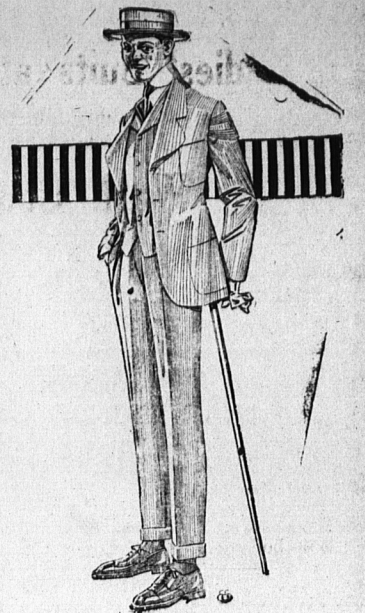

ISLAND BOY HAS NARROW ESCAPE BY JACK JOHNSON

The following letter has been received by Mr. B. W. Chandler, Mt. Alliston, from his nephew, Pte. S. E. Chandler, son of Mr. William A. Chandler, a boy of only eighteen, who is now at the front and wounded as the following interesting letter states.

Dear Uncle:—Just a line to let you know where I am and that I'm in Hospital. A Jack Johnson landed in our trench, killed eight men and wounded four. I had the good luck to come out alive although I was buried alive till they shovelled me out and I tell you I got some shock.

Well uncle I was in the hottest of it for three months and came through the two greatest battles in the world's history. Neuve Chappelle and Hill 60. It was our brigade that recaptured the lost guns. When the Germans saw us rushing up to them with glistening bayonets and everyone shouting and it about time to pray. I feel satisfied now that I am the only one out of my battalion of 120-20, and I am among the lucky. We have a great thing to say that we were given the Post of Honor and after the battle we had the sad roll call and our General was there and in his speech said "I knew the Black Watch could hold their own or I would not have put them there" and we did hold our own for we saved two batteries of Artillery. Well I guess this is all for now. Give my love to grandmother and the rest. I remain your loving nephew S. E. C.

IN HER 106th YEAR.
A remarkable Scotswoman, Mrs. Edmond, has passed away at Cardiff, Wales in her 106th year. For some time she has resided with her niece, who is the wife of Principal Griffiths, F. R. S., of the South Wales University College, and to the last she retained a keen interest in life, following each day's events as recorded in the newspapers with unflagging zest. On each anniversary of her birthday she had been for some years past the recipient of congratulations from the King and Queen, to whom she was introduced on their Majesty's visit to Cardiff nine years ago. On that occasion the Queen expressed a desire to make the personal acquaintance of Mrs. Edmond. When 92 years of age Mrs. Edmond had the misfortune to break her leg, but her vitality and powers of recuperation were still so great she made an excellent recovery, and was able to walk without the aid of a stick. Mrs. Edmond was born at Aberdeen on October 16, 1809. She was a girl of six when Napoleon was defeated at Waterloo, and used to recall, "as if it were yesterday" the horror which the very name of "Boney" produced in this country. One of her teachers, Mr. Martin had been a captain in Napoleon's army, and after the war found refuge in England. She spent seven years in France, and on her return to Aberdeen she married the celebrated orientalist, Dr. Marcus Satche, who was her first husband.

JOHNNY'S STRATEGY
Little sister had not been well and had been especially trying to small Johnny all day. Finally his patience came to an end. "Mother," he asked, "don't you want little sister to be a good wife when she grows up?" "Of course," said the mother. "Well, you make me give everything to her 'cause she's littler'n me. But you're littler'n father, and when he comes home you say—'Here's your slippers, dear'—and before his mother could move Johnny tore his train of cars from the screaming baby. "If we don't begin to train her she'll be a terrible wife," he said as he slammed the door.

JOHN McCORMACK NOT PRO-GERMAN.

(From the Montreal Gazette.)

"It's a lie," emphatically exclaimed any truth in the reports sent out night, when asked whether there was Mr. John McCormack, the famous Irish tenor, at the Ritz-Carlton last that he had expressed pro-German views. Ordinarily Mr. McCormack is the very prototype of Irish gentility, but on this particular subject he was not gentian. He thought a moment, and then repeated his remark, with further emphasis.

"One of the reasons I have come to sing here at Montreal is to be able to tell the people of Canada that that is a lie," declared Mr. McCormack. "I am a British subject, born at Athlone, and I want to tell you that if you are a pro-German I am sorry for you. I have not only sympathized with the British cause, but I have contributed to several funds. Further, when the need for tobacco was told of, I sent presents of 100,000 cigarettes, 50,000 for the boys at the front and 50,000 for those in hospitals.

"I don't know how this man could have sent out such stuff," declared Mr. McCormack. "Why, I have never been in Germany, and don't know what their rule would be like. Anyway, I feel pretty well off as I am, and the rest of us Irishmen seem to feel the same way, judging by the number of them that are out fighting and working for the Empire."

The Irish tenor could not get away from the subject of the war, and expressed delight that Italy had joined in it. "But," he added, "I want to tell you one thing—there are some men writing in England today who ought to be shot and hanged. If Lord Northcliffe were in Germany and tried to write such stuff as his papers are publishing now, he would not be left alive very long, nor his papers either."

As to himself, Mr. McCormack said he had had a good rest, and was in splendid voice. He remarked that he was going to cut out such songs as "Kathleen Mavourneen," which made tremendous demands on his voice, but he expected to sing as well as ever in his life. He declared he was particularly anxious to sing well here in view of the attacks that had been made upon him in Canada.

Asked if he was going back to Ireland Mr. McCormack laughed and replied, with a rich brogue, "I'll go back when the war is over, me boy, and there is no danger of submarines. Anyway, what should I go for? They don't want me there just now."

THE FARMER AND HIS SHARE.
The Journal of Commerce reports that on the 1st of March, in New Brunswick, farmers were selling their potatoes at 35 cents a barrel, while in Montreal the consumer was paying the grocer \$1.30 a barrel. In Denmark, it is said, the farmer gets 92 cents out of every dollar the ultimate consumer pays for the product of the farm, and on this continent the farmer gets from 35 cents to 60 cents on each dollar. Of course this is a land of magnificent distances, but even high freight charges will not account for this difference. When the farmer gets his share probably there will be more farmers.

"The guard, sorr," he said in his richest brogue, "is for Her Royal Highness, who, as a member of the Royal Family, is entitled to it!" After that the Duke could say nothing.
