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Schooner Lost Off Souris On Saturday Night

Capt. H. W. Ingalls And Crew Reach Souris Safely But With Loss Of All Their Personal Effects

The motor schooner, Sara Pauline, 35 tons register, H. W. Ingalls, master and owner, was lost Saturday night about four and one-quarter miles south by southwest of Souris. The schooner left the Magdalene Islands at 10 a.m. on Saturday with about 400 barrels of herring consigned to Pictou. About 5 p.m. Saturday afternoon when the schooner was off East Point it was discovered that she was leaking badly. The crew managed the pumps till 11 p.m. when the schooner was four and one-quarter miles south by southwest of Souris. As the decks were awash the crew of four men were forced to take to the dories. They arrived in Souris about 4 o'clock yesterday morning. The sea was exceedingly rough on Saturday night, and the men encountered great difficulties. They lost all personal effects. The captain wired for financial assistance and the men will proceed to their homes at Port Elgin and Halifax.

WEEKEND OF TRAGEDY IN NOVA SCOTIA

Three Dead, Two Missing and One Injured is Toll Over the Weekend.

HALIFAX, May 14 — (C. P.) — Three dead, two missing and one critically injured was the toll of weekend tragedy counted in Nova Scotia.

William Wright, 58 year old miner, died of gas fumes in the Allan shaft at Stellarton today.

At Garden Lots, Lunenburg county, Charles Meisner was found dying in his home. He had taken poison from a bottle closely resembling that from which he had been accustomed to take medicine.

NEW MINISTER TO CANADA IS WELCOMED

Hon. W. D. Robbins, Newly Appointed U. S. Minister and Mrs. Robbins Reach Ottawa.

OTTAWA, May 14—Welcomed by Premier R. B. Bennett and a distinguished representation of the Government and the diplomatic corps, Hon. Warren Delano Robbins, newly appointed United States Minister to Canada, and Mrs. Robbins reached Ottawa this afternoon. The Minister expressed his keen pleasure at the prospect of representing his country in the Dominion.

Mr. Robbins has been a very busy man during the past few weeks in Washington. His duties in the State Department included responsibility for the arrangements of the conferences which President Roosevelt is holding with representatives of various nations.

The Mahatma On Seventh Day Of Irrevocable Fast

POONA, India, May 14—Mahatma Gandhi today celebrated the seventh day of his "irrevocable" fast by a reconciliation with his eldest son, Hiraldal Gandhi, with whom the father had not been on speaking terms for a long time.

The Mahatma displayed quiet pleasure when his son arrived with Mrs. Gandhi at the villa of Lady Thackersey where he has been staying since his release from the Yeroda jail.

Gandhi patted his son affectionately on the back, exchanged a few words with him, then smilingly fastly on the reconciliation. It was evident the frail leader and his son were happy over the reconciliation, and apparently forgot the difference of views which led to their separation.

German Nazi Leader Will Defend Country's Policy Re Disarmament

VON PAPEN IN CRITICAL MOOD Compares Situation in Germany With that of 1914.

(Associated Press) MÜNSTER, Germany, May 14—Franz Von Papen today had offered the German people a comparison of the present situation in their country, with that of 1914 because "foreign nations are unable to comprehend the enormity of the spiritual evolution."

"We, because we have broken with the ideas of the last 150 years, will not be able to understand those who, with their state forms and sociological ideals, still waddle in the tracks of the French revolution," he said in an address before Steel Helmet war veterans and Nazis Saturday night.

"Through this misunderstanding and from the inability to comprehend the enormity of the spiritual evolution which has surged through Germany, a foreign political ring has circled us which is identical to that of August, 1914."

Herr Von Papen said Chancellor Hitler's speech before the Reichstag next Wednesday would show the world what Germany thinks of the situation and which way the German people are determined to go.

GERMAN ENVOY IS GIVEN NOISY SENDOFF

Dr. Alfred Rosenberg Hitler's Representative in London to His Chief.

LONDON, May 14—(A.P.)—Dr. Alfred Rosenberg, Chancellor Hitler's special representative in London who was called back suddenly to report to his chief, had a noisy sendoff today at Liverpool Street Station when he departed.

Upon his arrival at the station with representatives of the German Embassy, Dr. Rosenberg found the station alive with Communists who suddenly unfurled red flags and banners, threw leaflets and shouted derogatory remarks. The uproar continued until the participants were rounded up with difficulty by the police and forced back through the exits.

The Nazi representative travelled by an ordinary first class carriage. When he went to take his seat he found the compartment already full and he had to crowd himself in for his ride to Harwich.

Feminine Anglers Are Found By Searchers

KENTVILLE, N. S., May 14—Two feminine anglers were safe in their Kentville homes tonight, glad to be back after a fishing trip that almost had serious consequences.

They were Miss Winifred Webster and Mrs. Dorothy Kennedy, who had been lost for several hours in the nearby woods before a search party discovered them early this morning.

Miss Webster, who is vice-president of King's County Academy, and her companion set out fishing early Saturday morning. As they took a short cut through the woods, they became lost.

Wire Briefs

(Canadian Press) SYDNEY, N. S., May 14—Struck by a passenger bus as he crossed the street, seven-year-old Earl Sheppard lay critically injured in hospital tonight. Physicians held slight hopes for his recovery.

BELLEVILLE, Ont., May 14—(C.P.)—Judge Richard Douglas Ponton of Victoria and Haliburton Counties, prominent in civic, social, military and fraternal life of this city, died last night at the suburban home of his life-long friend, George K. Graham, He was 43.

HALIFAX, N. S., May 14—A Party of volunteer naval reserves from Montreal and Quebec arrived here on the Ocean Limited of the Canadian National Railways tonight (Sunday) to undergo a period of training. There were about fifty in the party.

OTTAWA, May 14—(C.P.)—Senator Gustave Lacombe, of Teumseh, Ontario, spent a fairly good day, it was stated at the General Hospital tonight. He is still under observation and is suffering from kidney trouble.

CORNWALL, Ont., May 14—(C.P.)—Victim of a drowning tragedy, Emilian Gatlen, 23, is dead. He is the fourth of a family of 17 children to come to an unnatural death and was drowned last night when the boat from which he and two companions were fishing upset.

RIOTING BREAKS OUT IN WISCONSIN

Enraged Farmers Dump Four Truckloads of Dairy Produce.

ELKHORN, Wis., May 14—(A.P.)—Rioting broke out today on the Wisconsin front of the milk strike and a mob of enraged farmers dumped four truckloads of dairy produce destined for the Chicago market.

One man was knocked unconscious as the farmers, numbering about 400, crashed through a line of 35 deputies protecting the trucks. Clubs and milk can covers were wielded as the farmers clambered aboard the trucks and dumped 30,000 pounds of milk. The disorder occurred near east Troy.

The battling farmers forced the deputies to retreat and Sheriff George O'Brien sent out a hurried call for 100 additional deputies. Before their reinforcements arrived the farmers had moved on—apparently into Waukesha county to patrol roads and confiscate milk headed for markets.

INVESTIGATE INSURANCE KILLINGS

Crime Syndicate Believed Comprised of Eight Men is Uncovered.

NEW YORK, May 14—A crime syndicate specializing in merciless "insurance killings" was envisioned tonight by the District Attorney's Office, as an attempt was made to connect eight men now held in the alleged slaying of an unemployed fireman with other sudden deaths.

Among the prisoners are an undertaker, a physician, a chemist and the owner of what police described as a speakeasy.

One set of investigators added two new more bizarre methods to the list of ways which the prisoners are charged with using in their long-unsuccessful attempt to do away with Michael Malloy, the fireman, so they could collect \$2,776 in insurance taken out on his life.

Deadlocked Over Redistribution

OTTAWA, May 14—With Conservatives and Liberals apparently at a hopeless deadlock over the redistribution, particularly in Saskatchewan and Quebec, and not yet unanimous in several other provinces, the outlook for ending the session this week did not seem very bright tonight.

LABOR MEMBER RENEWS SEVEN YEAR OLD BATTLE

GLASGOW, Scotland, May 14—(C. P. Cable)—Dr. Alfred Salter, London Labor member of the House of Commons, today renewed his seven-year-old battle against liquor in the House.

Dr. Salter, speaking at a Workers' Temperance meeting here, said drink was hurting the Labor party, which, he urged, should attract a large body of church and chapel-going people who are sympathetic to it but "unprepared to support labor as matters stand."

"In another part of his speech he declared "we have seen labor members of the House drinking night after night. We have seen another group go to the smoke room and soak until they were stu-

Veteran Elected As Candidate

BEDFORD, N. S., May 14—(C.P.)—Dr. Angus McD. Morien, sitting member of Halifax in the Nova Scotia Legislature, stood nominated tonight as conservative candidate for the new riding of Halifax west in this year's Provincial election.

Nomination of the veteran Halifax physician here Saturday brings up to 10 the number of candidates who have been named by both major provincial parties. Two laborites make up the other nominations.

Ultimatum Issued Chinese Forces In Tientsin Area

Anxiety Is Felt As Hostilities Along The Lwan River Increase — Foreign Interests Especially Alarmed At Reports.

TIENSIN, May 15—(A.P.)—Tientsin today was alive with unverified reports of impending developments in the Sino-Japanese conflict in this part of Northeast China. One of the chief reports causing anxiety was that the Japanese had handed the Chinese an ultimatum demanding the Chinese forces evacuate the Tientsin area and also Tankku, on the sea coast 35 miles east of Tientsin.

Tensions increased when unidentified persons hurled two bombs against the main gateway between the native city and the Japanese concession. The explosions rocked the neighborhood, but hurt nobody. As a result, however, both the Chinese and the Japanese in their respective areas turned out and increased their armed guards.

Foreign interests were especially alarmed at seemingly well-founded reports that the Chinese had blown up the Peiping-Mukden railway bridge over the Lwan River, in an effort to hamper the Japanese army advance. It was reported this action meant a protracted severance of the through railway traffic.

N. S. Legislature To Prorogue Tuesday

HALIFAX, May 14 — (C. P.) — Prorogation of the Nova Scotia Legislature by Tuesday afternoon was in prospect tonight as house members prepared to meet Monday to clean up final odds and ends of the sessional business.

The Legislature moved towards an early prorogation Saturday in approving estimates of the Department of Labor and Employment service, and setting aside \$3,500 for the inspection of factories.

Canadian Prime Minister Faces Busy Week

OTTAWA, May 15—(C.P.)—With two universities bestowing honorary degrees and Saint John tendering the freedom of the city, Premier R. B. Bennett will spend a busy week. Tonight the Prime Minister left for Hamilton where he will tomorrow receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws at McMaster University.

On Thursday, Mr. Bennett will be in his native Province, New Brunswick, where he will be the central figure at the celebration of the anniversary of the first arrival of the United Empire Loyalists, 150 years ago. The Prime Minister will be accorded the freedom of the city, and will address a mass meeting on Thursday afternoon.

MEANS CASE IS DEFINITELY DISPROVED

Federal Official Classifies Tale As "a Figment of a Weird Imagination."

WASHINGTON, May 14—(A.P.)—A federal official after investigating the story told by Gaston B. Means of his "contacts with the kidnapers of the Lindbergh baby today pronounced the tale "a figment of a weird imagination that makes Baron Munchausen look like a piker."

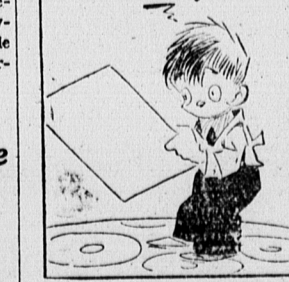
Definitely disproved was the statement that the Elizabeth N. J. safety deposit box of Max Hassell, murdered beer baron, contained either Mrs. Evelyn Walsh McLean's or Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh's ransom money.

The \$214,000 in currency in that box was all in denominations ranging from \$50 to \$5,000, federal men said, while the largest bills in the ransom money the Colonel paid out through J. F. Condon (Jasie) were twenties. Of the money Mrs. McLean turned over to Means \$90,000 was in twenties, \$10,000 in hundred dollar bills.

In Detroit investigations showed that one address given by Means from the witness stand yesterday as that of "Wellington Henderson" was the local headquarters of the worker's party. The name occurred in no available records.
