It appears that Premier Haultain and his colleagues of the Northwest Government are making representations at Ottawa with a view to having the Territories organized into a Province of the Dominion. This is a matter in which it may be well to go slowly. The entire population of the Territories is yet scant enough to form one Province. The plan which our public men have hitherto had in mind was to wait upon the settlement of the country until it was far enough advanced and then form two or more Provinces instead of the one now proposed.

A recent proclamation places under martial law those portions of Cape Colony which had so far remained under civil government. The entire Colony is now under martial law, somewhat modified so far as the seaports and docks are concerned. It is a stern measure but in the disturbed and disloyal conditions prevailing had no doubt become absolutely necessary if the war is to be brought to an end. The war has now entered on its third year since 12th October.

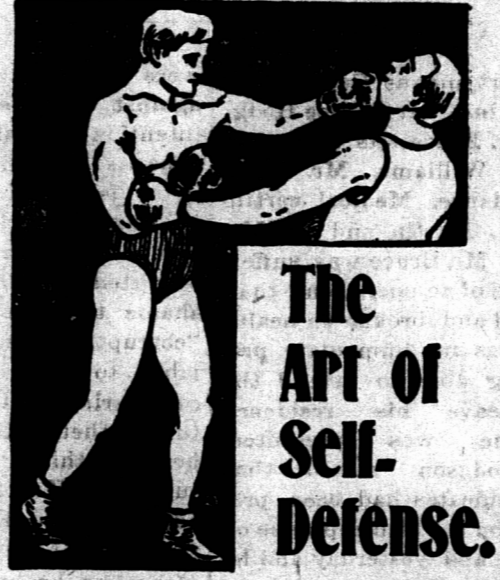
In one morning's duck shooting in Manitoba the Royal party bagged nearly 200 birds, of which 52 were shot by the Duke himself. Those who witnessed the sport speak in high praise of his unerring aim. His Royal Highness very seldom missed a bird, and greatly enjoyed shooting really wild game on the Manitoba marshes.

General Buller, who had two years ago as many admirers as any man in the British army, has since fallen sadly into disfavor. It is affirmed that his plan of campaign when he first went to South Africa involved sacrificing all else to save Natal. He sent Lord Methuen to Modder River with instructions to relieve Kimberly and then evacuate it, bringing the garrison back to Orange River. After Colenso he heliographed Gen. White to surrender Ladysmith. Cecil Rhodes, who was in Kimberly and Dr. Jameson who was in Ladysmith during the siege never forgave Buller and have since been working his downfall. The general public is shocked to think that the surrender of Kimberly and Ladysmith should have ever been contemplated by a British general.

Lord Brassey in a letter to the London Times furnishes a series of tables, which go to show that Britain is keeping well ahead of the combined naval strength of France and Russia. Since the Royal Sovereign period, Great Britain has built, or is building, forty-one battleships of seven distinct types and of a collective displacement of 500,850 tons. France has produced thirteen specimens, with a collective displacement of 159,566 tons, which is precisely the tonnage of Russia's fourteen ships of six distinct types. In first class cruisers, dating from the Imperieuse period, Great Britain has forty-nine ships of nine types and a displacement of 503,950 tons. France has nineteen first class cruisers of 181,065 tons, and Russia thirteen of 104,063 tons. In smaller ships Great Britain has an even more marked superiority. Parliament has voted wages for 118,025 officers and men for the permanent services, while France has 50,000 men and Russia less than 30,000.

**LOYALTY VS COMMERCIALISM IN CANADA.**

A correspondent of the Toronto World writing about the new issue of postage stamps which our change of monarchs has rendered necessary, makes a suggestion which is a good one, that scenes typifying the industrial resources of Canada takes the place of the monarch's head, as heretofore. We suggest that the Canadian Manufacturers' Association offer premiums for designs, to be submitted to the postmaster-general for adoption.—Canadian Manufacturer.
