### THE COOK'S CORNER

#### PARADISE SALAD

2 cups beet juice  
1 tablespoon sugar  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 tablespoon gelatin  
1-2 cups chopped beets  
1-2 cup chopped nuts  
1 teaspoon horseradish  
Method: Soak the gelatin for 5 minutes in 2 or 3 tablespoons cold water. Heat the beet juice with the sugar, lemon juice and salt and add the gelatin. Stir until it is dissolved, then set aside until it begins to jelly. Add the chopped beets, the nuts and the horseradish, drained. Mix well and turn into small moulds which have been rinsed in cold water and then drained and oiled. Chill until firm, unmould and serve on lettuce with mayonnaise or cooked salad dressing. Try this sometime with 1-2 cup grated pineapple instead of the nuts.

#### Apple Meringue

1 large tart apple  
Juice 1-2 lemon  
3-4 cup fruit sugar  
2 egg whites  
Method: Peel the apple and grate it. Sprinkle immediately with the lemon juice and sugar to prevent its turning brown. Beat the egg whites until they stand in peaks. Add the apple mixture gradually and continue to beat until this forms a thick meringue. It takes about 15 minutes beating. Turn into a tray of the refrigerator and freeze until firm, or if it's pretty cold outside and you have time, you can freeze it butted in the snow.

#### Chocolate Sauce

1-1 1/4 cups milk  
2 squares chocolate  
1-2 cup sugar  
1 tablespoon flour  
1-2 teaspoon salt  
1 tablespoon butter  
Method: Melt the chocolate in the milk and beat smooth. Add the sugar and flour which have been sifted together. Cook over hot water until the sauce is thick and smooth, about 15 minutes. Remove, add the butter and salt, and if you like, a half teaspoon of vanilla. Cool and serve over the apple meringue. If you prefer a richer chocolate sauce, here is another recipe for a hot fudge one.

#### Hot Fudge Sauce

1-1 1/2 cups sugar  
2 squares chocolate  
3-4 cup milk  
1-2 teaspoon vanilla  
Method: Put all the ingredients in a saucepan and cook slowly until the chocolate is dissolved. Then boil steadily until a few drops in cold water form a very soft ball. Remove from the fire and cool to lukewarm. Beat until creamy and lose its gloss and becomes creamy. If it is too thick, thin with a few drops of cream. Serve either warm or cold.

CLEANING FORETHOUGHT Cleaning forethought can save you wasted time and wasted effort. It's a good idea to spread your spring housecleaning over enough time, so that you are not completely exhausted on any one day. Also, plan the work so that not more than one room is used at a time. Check cleaning equipment to see that it is in order before you start; any repair work or any renewals should be made before the equipment is needed. Order a sufficient supply of cleaning materials before you begin to carry you through the entire operation.

Light Pillows Indicate Good Quality A pillow can be checked for resiliency by depressing its centre with the fingers of the hand. If it quickly regains its shape after the pressure is removed, there is still life and buoyancy in the feathers. If not it is indication that the feathers are probably worn out and a new pillow needed. Good quality feather pillows are light in weight—an all about one and a half pounds weight and chicken feather pillows of the same size weigh one and two pounds more respectively.

Match Spring and Mattress When buying a new bedding, be sure to select the paper type of bedspring to use with the mattress. Experts say, should have firm boxspring or a metal coil heavy pad for keeping the mattress from working down. The larger coils of the bedspring, thin and longer to greater sleeping comfort. Mattresses that do not have inner-spring units need a resiliency spring or an open coil metal spring.

Piano Keys To clean piano keys wash with solution of equal parts of peroxide of hydrogen and water. Use a clean white cloth slightly dampened with the solution to rub the keys gently until soil is removed.

TORONTO—The experience of Cape Breton Island with toxoid immunization against diphtheria, as reported in the Canadian Public Health Journal, is cited by the Health League of Canada as evidence that toxoid should be used as early as possible in the child's life, and that fewer than the prescribed three doses do not give immunity.

Cape Breton Island began a systematic campaign against diphtheria in the schools of Glace Bay in 1938. Later the campaign was extended to all towns and rural sections of Cape Breton County. In 1938, there were 127 cases of diphtheria. The following year the cases had been reduced to 35 and the deaths to six. In 1940 there were 16 cases and no deaths. In the course of the campaign tests proved that children with only one or two doses of toxoid were not fully immunized, and that non-toxoided children were the ones who fell victims to the disease.

The official report states that important as it is to treat school-age children "emphasis must be placed on the necessity of immunizing the pre-school group, for it is this group that bears the brunt of an epidemic of the common communicable diseases."

TORONTO—Figures released by United States Public Health Service show that while typhus fever is raging in Germany and other parts of the European continent, not one case was reported from Britain, according to the Health League of Canada.

There were 209 cases of the disease in Germany during January and February of this year, with additional cases in March. This figure was the second highest for European countries reporting. Rumania coming first with 337 cases. These facts, the League suggests, emphasize the importance Britain is placing on the subject of public health, and Nazi indifference to the welfare of the general citizen.
