A general discussion took place in regard to best means to be adopted in carrying on the Pledge Card Campaign in conjunction with all other Provinces of Canada. A certain definite scheme was decided upon.

The date of the distribution of cards was not decided upon as it will take some weeks to give full information through schools, clergy and the societies throughout the Island. Mr. Wm. Kerr the Provincial Organizer was present and outlined his scheme for the work. Miss Sterns, Supervisor of Women's Institutes also consented to give a practical demonstration in preserving and canning vegetables and fruits at the Provincial Exhibition next week.

In the death of Dr. William Kier which occurred on Monday evening last at his home in Malpeque, the province has lost probably its oldest medical practitioner and certainly one of its most beloved physicians. Although he had passed his ninetieth year last November he attended to the duties of his profession, visiting patients even at a distance, till within a few days of his death. He could scarcely have been said to be ill even during the last few days but "approached the grave as one who wraps the drapery of his couch about him and lies down to pleasant dreams." It has been given to few men to win the love and the confidence bestowed upon the late Dr. Kier by all who knew him and especially by those to whom he ministered as their physician. For three generations his name has been a household word in Malpeque and the districts adjacent and in many homes beyond these bounds, and his kind, tender and sympathetic solicitude for his patients as well as his undoubted skill as a physician endeared him to all. He will be mourned in the community not only as a skilled and eminently successful doctor but as a personal friend in every home.

He was a doctor of the old school, beginning his practice in Malpeque in his early twenties, almost seventy years ago. He was a son of the late Rev. Dr. Kier, the founder and first minister of the present Presbyterian congregation of Princetown and throughout his long and busy life took a keen and helpful interest in everything that made for the welfare of the community. His wife predeceased him by over a year. There are left to mourn two daughters, Mrs. Preston McNutt, Malpeque and Miss Annie at home, Dr. Erskine Kier, Alberton, John at home, Dr. James, Malpeque and Edgar in Western Canada. The funeral will take place today at 2 o'clock.

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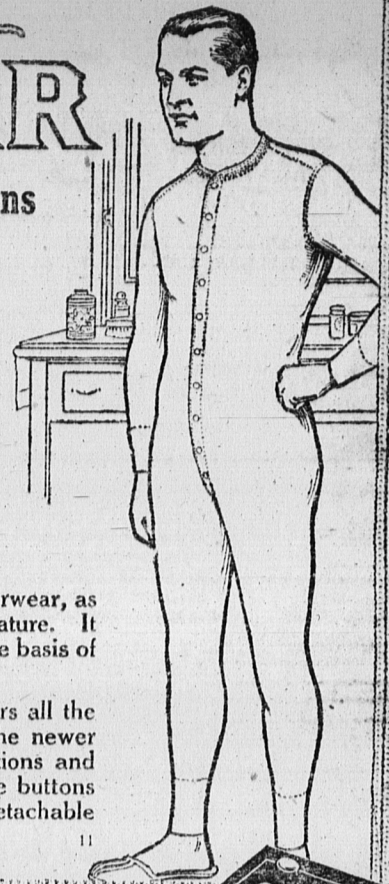
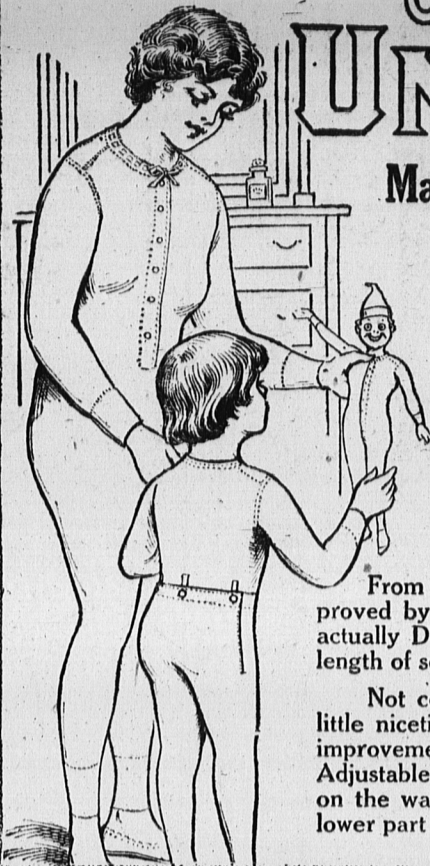

**BOY SHOT AT TIGNISH.**—A fatality, under extremely sad circumstances, occurred on Sunday at Tignish. Master Ralph Jacques, aged 11 years, and his aunt, Mrs. Herbert Crockett, from the United States, were visiting Mr. John Harper, the latter's brother-in-law. All were sitting at dinner, except Master Ralph, when they were startled by a loud report just outside the house. Outside they found the boy dead, the charge from a gun, which unknown to anyone he had taken from the house, having passed through his neck, causing instantaneous death. Just how the accident occurred is unknown. The unfortunate lad was the only son of a widow, Mrs. Ralph Jacques, who resides in Boston. The remains were forwarded yesterday.

A meeting in aid of the British Red Cross was held in the Legislative Council Chamber last night at the instance of His Honour the Lieutenant Governor and Lt.-Col. Jenkins, Honorary Secretary of the Canadian Red Cross at Charlottetown. The attendance although not large was representative of those active in Patriotic work and included a number of ladies. Correspondence was submitted from

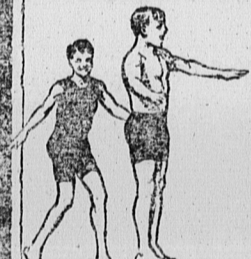
His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire, Patron of the Red Cross Society, from Lord Stanley, Chairman of the British Red Cross, Lord Lansdowne, Chairman of the Red Cross Council, and from Mr. Noel Marshall, Chairman of the Executive Committee, Toronto, with respect to an appeal to be made on October 18th for funds in aid of the British Red Cross. The correspondence indicated that the expenditure of the Society now amounts to eight thousand pounds (\$40,000) a day and is increasing. It was pointed out that unless contributions come in more liberally it will mean that the efforts of the Red Cross in caring for the wounded soldiers and sailors must necessarily be curtailed.

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor, who occupied the chair explained the object of the meeting showing the great need of funds for this worthy object and the necessity for prompt action on the part of this province which, in view of the efforts being made throughout the dominion, must rise to the occasion and make a creditable showing.

His Hon. Judge Hazzard, Col. Jenkins, Col. Moore, Rev. Dr. Fullerton, and Mr. Joseph McCarey addressed the meeting, all urging prompt action, and an immediate move towards organization. It was decided that a collection be conducted by the ladies who canvassed the City for a like purpose in 1915 and that they be asked to organize at once. The incorporated towns are to be communicated with and also the school districts with the request for an active campaign be conducted with a view to making a thorough canvass of every section of the province. Mr. Joseph McCarey acted as Secretary.

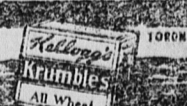
