THE NEW BRUNSWICK COMMISSION.

The New Brunswick commissioners who are studying the working of Prohibition are coming to this Province very shortly. Regrettably they are appointed by a Government which has so far shown no disposition to go beyond a license law, and the majority of the commissioner no doubt share the feelings and wishes of those who appointed them. Still we are very glad the commissioners are coming to study the question on the ground, and we believe that the cause of Prohibition must gain rather than lose by any fair and impartial investigation of the record of the past few years and the conditions existing today.

Unfortunately, here as in the State of Maine, the authority enacting the Prohibitory Law has no power to prevent the free importation of intoxicants. That power belongs only to the national Parliament. A Prohibitory Law for the Dominion would in that respect be more potent for good than the law which we have today. It would still be evaded, no doubt as the law against smuggling is violated and evaded. It would require perpetual vigilance as the anti-smuggling law will always require vigilance. Today in some of the border towns, like St. Stephen, N. B. and Windsor, Ont. the smuggling business is very great, but no one proposes on that account that the law shall be repealed and the smuggler be left free to ply his trade without penalty.

What may fairly be claimed for the Prohibitory Law in Prince Edward Island is that it has entirely closed the open bars, has greatly reduced the amount of drunkenness and has made of our Island Province a community the most sober and orderly, and the freest from serious crime that exists today in Canada or in the world. With this great and favorable change, we have increased prosperity, better hotels, better streets and sidewalks, more comfort, happiness and content than before the law came into operation. A fair investigation by the commissioners will demonstrate these facts and in doing so will confirm the opinion prevalent among the great majority of our people that the Prohibitory Law is a wise and beneficial enactment.

THE PRESS AND THE TUNNEL

As we have already remarked, never before has the entire press of Canada seemed disposed to give so much fair and unbiased attention to the Tunnel question. A large number of influential journals have given publicity to the Guardian's figures in regard to what the Tunnel would save and what it would earn, most of them with favorable or approving comment. So far as we have read there has been no unfavorable criticism and no attempt to question or challenge the reasonable accuracy and fairness of our figures and estimates.

Among others, the widely circulated and influential Toronto News, after quoting from the Guardian's articles concludes that "the Government should give this statement full consideration." La Presse of Montreal, the most widely circulated of the French Canadian journals, in a strong article based on the Guardian's figures which it quotes, says that the federal Government should seriously consider the project of constructing the Tunnel. These are most hopeful indications. The Tunnel heaven is working with increasing energy these days, and the friends of that work have good grounds to take courage.

Hitherto the great obstacle in the way of a favorable consideration of the Tunnel has been the cost of the undertaking. Now the eyes of the Canadian public are being opened, as if for the first time, to the fact that the Tunnel need not cost Canada a single dollar over and above what she now paying for an altogether inadequate and unsatisfactory service. Al

would like to do justice to Prince Edward Island, to remove a long standing and serious grievance and danger, and they are now coming to see that the Tunnel would do this and at the same time involve no additional charge upon the public revenue. There is no other public project today of equal promise with the Tunnel. The growth of this conviction has begun, and that is the great and hopeful symptom of the times as far as our Province is concerned.

A reader who sends a dollar in appreciation of The Guardian's work for the Tunnel has our thanks. The amount is placed to his subscription account. The advocacy of the Tunnel is made wholly on grounds of the necessity and public utility of the work. It is none the less encouraging to find that our readers set a substantial value upon the work that is being done to promote that important project.

A business firm in Quebec Province in a letter to a firm here incidentally mentions that "all the money we might spend otherwise in your city goes toward satisfying the appetite of your Government, which has the immense gail of charging us \$300 a year for visiting your place every six months. We might as well try to sell goods in United States as in Prince Edward Island; the fence is not much higher." It had been hoped that when the increased subsidy took effect the tax on commercial travellers would be abolished.
