PROMINENT P. E. ISLANDER

Prince Edward Island has a noted publicity man in Los Angeles in the person of J. A. Crozier, who hails from Malpeque, P. E. I. He is the founder, secretary and treasurer of the Winnipeg Club of Los Angeles, with offices in the Garland Building, says the Oakland Maple Leaf. This bureau safeguards all Canadian-born who come to Los Angeles. Three times a year they select special talent to lecture before the association on how to become true American citizens, and the steps that one must take to reach that end.

Mr. Crozier is a graduate of Doctor Catherine Blackburn's School of Psychology in Chicago, where he spent two years; also of School of Scientific Salesmanship at Evanston, Illinois. He was a student of Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, P.E.I.

Last July he was on a trip to Canada and visited his old home in P. E. I. On this trip he spoke before the Kiwanis Club of Winnipeg; he also lectured in Vancouver. During the World War he was under the British Consulate Service, and toured over the States of Arizona, New Mexico, Texas and Wisconsin, speaking before crowded houses on the urgency of buying Liberty Bonds and thrift stamps. In 1914 he returned to Canada and enlisted in the 90th Winnipeg Rifles. In that year Great Britain and Canada selected 48 men among their army officers to spread useful propaganda in the United States and Canada, and Mr. Crozier was the officer commanding.

Mr. Crozier, whose maiden name was Emma Walker, is a native of London, Ont., and a woman who shares some of the business success of her husband. Horatio Walker, known as the Milletie artist of Canada, is Mrs. Walker's brother. He is a member of the Royal Academy of London, England.

In Mr. Crozier's office one finds two large silk flags, one British, the other American, gifts of Mr. McCurdy, managing director of the Winnipeg Tribune. Also large photographs where he is seen on the platform with the late Lillian Russell, and Mr. Raymond, the famous actor. An interview with Mr. Crozier becomes a revelation of business success. He owns one of the finest modern homes in Los Angeles. He is held in much esteem by the Winnipeg Club and other societies.
