The Budget Debate in most Legislative Assemblies is usually the climax of the session. In our own House the situation is peculiar owing to the fact that the number of members supporting the Government is four times as many as the number on the Opposition side.

These six are freemen; the twenty-four are not free; they are bound by a pledge which they secretly signed during the election campaign.

From this confession of the blot which clouds the election of one member of the Saunders Government's majority we are left to guess, as best we may, how many more of them are in a like discreditable predicament.

Independent and sensible electors are not usually disposed to deal very gently with members for whom they voted at the last election.

Premier Saunders, good man, who recently had a Judgeship within his grasp, seems to have a faculty of misjudging hastily various public matters that are vital to the welfare of the Province.

Then the hasty payment of \$80,000 for road machinery without the indispensable authority of an Order in Council, showed a capacity for blundering quite beyond all precedent in the records of administration.

Few men have the gift of political leadership and Mr. Saunders is not one of the few. He is endowed with many estimable qualities of mind and heart, but these alone are not sufficient to qualify him as a Prime Minister and the Leader of a party.

When Parliament resumes its sitting at Ottawa the important question of the St. Lawrence Waterway will be among the larger measures to be considered.

We have acquired the habit of looking to the Publicity Association for such publicity as is likely to attract visitors to our province.

The business of attracting tourists must not, however, be left entirely to the Publicity Association. It is doing its work well and to it we are indebted to the growth of the tourist business in the past few years.

BLAMING THE STOMACH

Although this is an age of specialists in medicine there is one point that is being brought home to the profession very forcibly just now.

For instance the amount of stomach juice, the amount of acid in it, whilst important, is not really as important as the proper movements of the stomach in the maintenance of health and the causation of disease.

As mentioned once before there is a sort of tidal movement between stomach and first part of the small intestine which regulates the amount of acid in the stomach.

Further, some foods that get safely past stomach give trouble further down, and cause a stoppage, or stagnation, as it is called.

On the other hand movement in intestine can be actually helped by a little thought.

If you are willing to bend from side to side a few times, with "knees straight," and then lie on your back, and slowly raise legs to a right angle, with knees straight.
