NOMINATION DAY.

To-day is the official nomination day in the Dominion general election. The two parties have been very busy during some weeks past with the result that in several of the provinces the lists are full and in all the provinces are nearly so. It is probable, however, that as the result of to-day's proceedings some members of both parties will be returned by acclamation. There is no present prospect of such an occurrence in this province, but elsewhere there are a few cases where an unopposed return may be expected. One of these is in Northumberland, N. B. where Mr. Robinson, Conservative, a former supporter of Mr. Blair in the Provincial Legislature, has since given the Laurier Government an independent support, and hence is not now opposed.

Then there is Mr. John Charlton, who poses as a very independent Liberal in Norfolk and is likely to be returned by acclamation to-day for want of an opponent.

Another case is that of Mr. Puttee in Winnipeg, who was returned at a bye-election as an independent labor candidate. He gave a general support to the Government and is classed as a Liberal and supported by the Winnipeg Free Press, the leading Liberal journal in Manitoba. He is likely to be returned by acclamation today. There are other cases where one or the other of the parties appear to have no candidate, although one may be placed at the last moment. In other cases a few candidates may be found who as the result of a compromise, or from their unfavorable chances will decline to go to the polls. Altogether we shall not be surprised if from six to ten seats are disposed of by acclamation to-day.

IN NEWFOUNDLAND.

In the Newfoundland elections which take place on the day following our own the chief issue will be the Reid contract. As is known, that bargain transferred to Mr. R. G. Reid 650 miles of railway, together with timber and mineral lands, telegraph lines, steamboats &c. When Mr. Reid went to England to borrow money to develop his properties he found that capitalists would prefer to deal with a company rather than with an individual. Hence Mr. Reid wants to form a limited liability company in which he and his sons shall be the shareholders.

But to do this he needs legislation, and he cannot get this from the Bond Administration.

Premier Bond proposed that Mr. Reid should concede the restoration of the telegraph lines to the Government and undertake to transfer the railway at the end of 50 years. This proposal Mr. Reid rejects, and insists that the railway, telegraph and lands are each essential to him and that he could not surrender either of them without impairing the value of the others. If the Government is sustained Mr. Reid will not be able to obtain the charter for his company. If the opposition are successful they will probably assist him in carrying out the contract, which they made with him when they were in power. At this distance we have no definite idea of the relative chances of the two parties for success.

In the midst of a hot campaign, our esteemed contemporary the Daily Examiner has donned an entirely new dress and presents a decidedly improved appearance. THE GUARDIAN extends congratulations.

Prince Christian Victor, whose death from enteric fever at Pretoria is announced, is son of the Princess Helena, and grandson of Queen Victoria. The Princess Helena Augusta Victoria, born in 1846, married in 1873 Prince Frederic Christian of Schleswig-Holstein. They had issue three sons and two daughters. One of the sons died in infancy, and now the eldest son Christian Victor has passed away. He was born in 1877 and was a Major in the King's Royal Rifles. He has served in South Africa since January last.

Born in Ontario in 1813 and educated there, served in the Fenian raid on the Niagara frontier 1838 and also in Red River Expedition 1870. Promoted to com-
