PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND STUDENTS' GIFT FUND

The above named fund has been opened solely for the students of Prince Edward Island in order that they may have the privilege of each contributing something in the name of patriotism, uniting the interest of the growing generation in a Common Cause.

The maximum contribution amount has been fixed at twenty-five cents (25 cts.), so that every pupil of any educational institution in the Province has an opportunity to have his, or her name on the list.

What The Fund Is to Be Used For

The money is to be used for the purchase of two army field kitchens as the pupils' gift to our own Island soldiers. One kitchen is for the P. E. Overseas Heavy Artillery Battery now in camp at Charlottetown, and the other for the P. E. I. Infantry Company now being formed for Overseas Service. These brave men are recruited from all parts of the Island, hence each pupil may have a particular interest in providing a gift that will prove of some comfort in the midst of hardships that must be endured.

Should there be a surplus after providing for these two units, it is proposed to hand it in the name of the students to the 'Soldiers' Disablement' which has been especially commended to our consideration by the Acting Minister of Militia. Briefly stated the principal object of that fund is to supplement the pension granted by the Government to disabled soldiers in cases where this is insufficient for proper maintenance, while the low his former vocer learning and assisted in the way of learning and taking up some new occupation within the scope of his crippled ability. Questions will be cheerfully answered by any of the undersigned.

The Press will generously acknowledge subscriptions through the newspaper columns, and thus materially lessen expense of running fund. The only remuneration sought by any member of the Committee is, to see the undertaking terminate a success in every way.

This Fund is to be in every sense the Island Pupils' "very own." They have now the privilege of doing their share of good work, and we are confident that both they and the people at large will be surprised at how much will be accomplished as a result of their efforts.

side of artillery fire. The French have given them a terrible bombardment. Two weeks without intermission it lasted. We could hear it day and night. We expect to hear of the French having broken through, but everything will come in its own good time. The Germans must have lost terribly in the Russian invasion and she will soon find herself unable to reinforce her armies. Then she will soon go under. The country looks beautiful here now behind the lines. If we could only forget the ruined farm-houses and villages it is worth ones while to go for a stroll, but on all sides brick walls and disrupted gardens and fields, mark what must have been at this time of the year a veritable Eden.

Do you know I came across a maple tree here the other day and my mind took a quick trip back to old Canada. The maple leaf looks pretty good to us now. There are many young men in Canada with no ties to bind them, in whose boots I would not like to stand in the years to come. I wonder what course they will offer for their unwillingness to do their bit. I heard a good one about a local singer in B. C. who thinks he is doing his bit by having himself invited to worry the people with his instrumental songs at all the little gatherings for war funds that they may have. I suppose he will preen himself as some here in the years to come. I guess there are lots of the same kind in P. E. I. Lip loyalty is all right but not enough at this stage of the game. There will certainly be no mercy extended to Canada if the Allies are defeated.

I met several more P. E. Is. A. Murray from Charlottetown (his father is a shoe maker on King St.), A. Carriger or something like that, and two more whose names I have forgotten. They are all well. I went to try to see Parker Crockett the other day but could not find him. There are some other Islanders in the 4th Bri. but they are in the trenches. When we are out and vice versa, I shall be going on a seven days furlough some time in a month or so. I don't know whether I shall have time to go to Carbon or not. I shall try, but a person will want a rest instead of traveling around. I may leave my visit to Ireland until after the war. The nurses at the base are awfully good. There are three of them write to me every week and send me magazines and parcels. I suppose I shall have to bring them all back with me and start a Mormon establishment. If you hear of a big scrap soon do not be worried as I feel sure of coming out safe. I am certainly not through with Canada yet. Well dear mother, remember me to
