It will be remembered that Rev. Dr. McLeod of Fredericton, N. B., was a candidate for the House of Commons during the last general election at which he was unsuccessful. During the contest he announced his intention of carrying on a pure election, and if beaten by corrupt practices that he would take action in the election courts. Several election petitions on both sides have been withdrawn by mutual agreement, but Dr. McLeod declines to be a party to any such compromise and the York County petition will come to trial, with what result remains to be seen. Rev. Dr. McLeod is well known here as an advocate of prohibition and the Scott Act.

Nikola Tesla, the noted but very imaginative electrician, thinks he has detected an attempt by the people of Mars to signal to us electrically. Almost at the same time a number of astronomers have observed a series of flash lights thrown broadly upon one of the Martian seas. This is thought by some imaginative persons to be an attempt to signal us by means of light. This is possible, but very improbable. Even if such signals could be exchanged they would long be a difficulty in reading the message intended to be conveyed. The Martian language is not yet taught in our colleges.

It is announced that the pay of census enumerators will be \$3 per day and commissioners \$4 per day, and as the time of employment for the former is expected to be about two weeks, and of the latter four weeks, there will not be very much money in the job. Still there will no doubt be many applicants.

Kruger's illness has taken a serious turn and it is now predicted that he will not recover. He is now an old man, and the change of residence from Pretoria to continental Europe during the winter season would under any circumstances prove a trying one.

It is sad to read that Lord Dufferin's fortune was quite swept away by the recent financial disaster. He had been lured into speculation, and when he appeared at a meeting of shareholders in London a few days ago there were hisses and cries of "Turn him out!"

Chatham, N. B. found the first Sunday in the new century a very peculiar one, all the churches being closed and meetings forbidden on account of the smallpox.

OWING to the isolated position of this province, and experience with winter steamers the wonderful power of the Ermack is referred to from time to time as a type of a steamer for the service between the Island and the mainland. An exchange says: The Russian ice-breaking steamer "Ermack," which has on trials forced its way through ice fourteen feet thick, is now fitting out in England for an attempt to reach the North Pole. She will be commanded by Vice-Admiral Makaroff, of the Russian navy.
