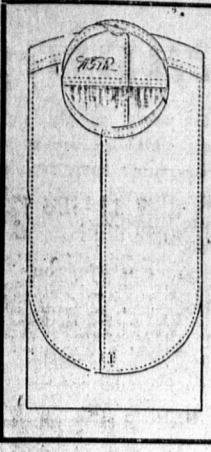

THERE'LL BE WIRELESS FROM COAST TO COAST

Marconi Hopes to Connect Halifax and Vancouver This Year. Inventor, Who is at Montreal With His Bride, Says the Glace Bay Station Will Be Ready for Test Across Atlantic in a Few Weeks—

MONTREAL, April 11 Signor Marconi, of wireless telegraph fame, and his bride, Hon. Beatrice O'Brien, of Dublin, arrived in Montreal yesterday. The inventor is enroute from New York to Glace Bay, where he will make experiments with the wireless station.

Tonight Mr. Marconi said that he would leave for Glace Bay Wednesday as the company's new station at that place was nearing completion, and a test would be made in a few weeks. The Marconi company had spent \$200,000 on the station, but progress had been delayed owing to the severe winter in Cape Breton. Should the equipment not be completed within the time expected, Mr. Marconi will proceed to Newfoundland where the government of that colony are interesting themselves in several stations on the coast.

A BIG THEATRE PANIC IN AN INDIANA TOWN

Four Hundred Persons Killed or Injured by the Collapse of a Reservoir in Spanish Capital: A Hundred Mutilated Bodies so Far Recovered.

KOKOMO, Ind., April 11.—A score of persons were seriously injured during a fire in the Sipe theatre caused by the ignition of a roll of celluloid film used in operating a moving picture machine. In the panic that followed George Armstrong aged 17, jumped from a window in the third floor and sustained probably fatal injuries.

Madrid, April 8.—Four hundred persons were killed or injured today by the collapse of a new reservoir in course of construction here. The catastrophe caused a profound sensation throughout the city. All work was suspended and people flocked to the scene. Working parties are gradually removing the debris and continue to

recover the mutilated bodies and fragments of flesh. The collapse was so sudden and complete that it was impossible to tell what happened. As the greater part of the debris is under water the work of rescue is most difficult. Up to now a hundred bodies have been recovered and 200 injured have been rescued.

Later it appears that underneath the foundation which collapsed on Saturday were water pipes used to supply the palace and old Madrid. It is stated this was the cause of the subsidence. Many heart-rending incidents and painful scenes are reported. Ten of the rescued have gone mad.

Y. M. C. A. NOTES OF INTEREST.

Baptist Sunday was when Rev. G. R. White spoke on "The Kingdom of God, Where is it?"

Episcopal Sunday was when Rev. S. J. Woodroffe spoke on the subject "If Christ came to Charlottetown."

The choirs of the different Churches in turn conducted the service of song.

Next Sunday will be peculiarly the Y. M. C. A. Sunday and on this occasion the President W. S. Lonsou will report of the Dominion Convention which has just closed in Montreal.

Special selections will be sung by the Y. M. C. A. male quartet. Meeting will be open for men and women.
