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GERMAN STEAMERS

LONDON, Dec. 30.—The Daily Mail's Berlin correspondent states he has been officially informed that the Hamburg-American Line has decided to compete with the Canadian-American Japanese lines for the Pacific trade between western ports of North America and the Far East.

The new service will be inaugurated as early in the New Year as practical, and will be in the nature of an extension of the company's existing service in the Far East of their vessels proceeding from Chinese and Japanese ports to Vancouver, Seattle, Portland and San Francisco.

BRISTOL, December 31.—The local branch of the United Irish League reissues, in a manifesto, the resolutions of the Unionist M. P.'s to speak on behalf of the Ulster men in notifying Aquith of his intention to mean amendment to the Home Rule Bill, excluding Ulster from its operation.

STRIKERS MAKE THREAT

LEITH FALLS, N. Y., Dec. 30.—Delegates from the ranks of striking textile workers here testified today before the State Board of Arbitration that their lives had been threatened after returning to work by the men and women still out on strike.

Mrs. Annie Ryan who quit the strikers' ranks had been harassed and threatened ever since. Pickets, she said, told her they would kill her unless she quit.

Kate Seeman at work again testified that strikers had threatened to blow her house up unless she quit.

WAR NEWS.

CONSTANTINOPLE, December 31.—Several Turkish Senators have addressed telegrams to the European sovereigns calling attention to massacres, which they allege continue in Turkey's European provinces, in spite of the armistice and which "threaten the complete extermination of the Moslem population."

DETECTIVE LOSES SUIT.

MONTEAL, Dec. 30.—Mr. Justice Pothier of the Supreme Court dismissed, with costs this morning the action for \$5,000 taken by Supt. Carrington of the Thiel Detective Agency against Austin Mosher of the Gazette, for alleged slander, the conversation in question having been reported to Carrington by Chief Detective McCaskill of the Provincial Police. This was one of the subsidiary suits arising out of the famous David Russell case against the Pinkertons.

HALIFAX HAS GOOD YEAR

HALIFAX, Dec. 30.—The total value of the yield of the farms, factories, fisheries, forests, mines and live stock of Nova Scotia, according to the summary to be published in the Halifax Herald to-morrow, is \$134,832,148.

The total coal shipments from Nova Scotia mines amounted to 6,333,000 tons and the value at the pit's mouth is placed at \$25,000,000. The lumber shipments were reduced by high ocean freights. The agricultural yield is \$28,000,000. The gold mine output, which has been constantly diminishing, is down to \$95,000.

BOSTON, Dec. 30.—With her chief officer badly injured and her deck fittings battered, the British freight steamer Daley reached Boston today after a tempestuous passage from Cotte and Marcellus. The Daley was damaged on Christmas day when she was caught between two towering seas. One broke over the forward deck while the other struck the steering gear was out of commission at the time. Chief Officer Robert Blanco was thrown against the rail with such force that both legs were broken and he was otherwise injured.

IMPORTANT MOVE TO BRING TO BRING PACE.

PARIS, Dec. 31.—The most important move yet made to relieve the tension in Europe resulting from the Balkan war was made here today when P. A. Iswolsky, Russian ambassador to France, called upon M. Raymond Poincare, the French foreign minister and proposed that Russia and Austria go into accord upon the immediate demobilization of their reserves. Mr. Poincare took the matter under advisement, promising to consult with Austrian representatives.
