Death Of Mr. Frank Russell Lidstone

Mr. Frank Russell Lidstone passed away suddenly yesterday morning at the home of his sister, Mrs. George A. Bonness, Summerside.

The late Mr. Lidstone suffered from heart trouble and came back to this province last summer on his doctor's advice.

The late Mr. Lidstone was 65 years old and was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Edward Lidstone, of Cape Wolfe, P. E. I.

In addition to his brother here, other survivors include a brother, Leslie in Nova Scotia and two sisters, Mrs. Jack MacWilliams, Sackville, N. B., and Miss Adele Lidstone, in Baltimore Md. He was unmarried.

The funeral will be held at one o'clock on Wednesday evening at a service at the United Church, Cape Wolfe. Burial will be in the church cemetery. The remains will be forwarded to Cape Wolfe from Summerside on Saturday evening.

IN MEMORIAM

On the 21st of December, 1940, John Charles Gordon after a few months illness, passed peacefully away at his home "Blair Athol", Cardigan, P. E. I.

Mr. Gordon was born at Brudenell, on April 11th, 1866, and was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Gordon (nee Jane P. Springwood). He was a worthy descendant of the late pioneers of Three Rivers, who came over from Perthshire, Scotland, in 1802, a number of whom established homes along Brudenell River and vicinity.

Mr. Gordon was the owner of the estate of "Blair Athol" and it should be noted that he was named after Charles Gordon who was father of Donald Gordon, Brudenell piercer and owner of the estates of "Blair Athol", Perthshire, Scotland. Through him in attitude, he was first cousin of the late Dr. George Byron Gordon, famed archaeologist, anthropologist and author, and the late Lord Dewar, Lord of Council and in occupation, Mr. Gordon showed himself as a successful farmer and stock raiser. His ability as a skilled breeder and feeder of live stock was obvious to all and he had in his possession both dairy and beef breeds. He was a lover of horses as he was from the excellent type in his stable and derived great enjoyment from training and driving them. Like many of his other characteristics this trait was undoubtedly derived from his Scottish forbears who were keenly interested in this sport.

He was originally a member of Montague Christian Church but for some time and in his family worshiped at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Cardigan. He never forgot the instruction which was given him by his father, the early training received from a mother's knee. He brought such Christian tuition to his own home where he took his children, and continually pointing out the way of life to his children, reading the Bible to them, and joining enthusiastically in the singing of the hymns with a great inclination for the old favorites.

He was a kind and affectionate in spirit, honest and upright in all his transactions; a loving husband and father with a boundless sympathy for the poor and needy in need even at the cost of his own weariness and discomfort.

During his illness his nurse was Mrs. J. Shaw, R. N., and he also tenderly cared for by his loving and devoted wife (nee Daisy James) whom he leaves to mourn with three children, Mrs. E. Ethel, Daisy Doris and J. Kelso. The following brother and sisters deeply mourn his passing: Starford Gordon, Brudenell; Margaret (Mrs. R. C. Dewar) Brudenell, Jean G. Brudenell, Lillian I. (Mrs. Alden) Brudenell, Mrs. M. A. (Mrs. C. L. Boyer) Charlottetown. He was predeceased a few years ago by a beloved sister and brother-in-law, Henry Gordon. After a short service at his home, where the Rev. H. Mathews played some of his favorite hymns, the burial took place in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Cardigan, and here a large number of friends and neighbors came to pay tribute to one who had been worthy of their respect. The service was conducted by the Minister, the Rev. H. Mathews, and was assisted by the Rev. P. Richardson. Mr. Richardson spoke about heavenly life during the service, and eloquently described the Christian's death as sleep. The Rev. Mathews spoke of the occasions when he had been in the company of Mr. Gordon and how Charles had enjoyed God's Word and the singing of such hymns as "Jesus, Lover of My Soul". The Minister added that since his coming to Canada, he had not met anyone who had exemplified the Christian character so beautifully and therefore died with such assurance as Mr. Charles Gordon. He sympathized with the mourners and the church concluded by saying that if all present could only be so well prepared as Mr. Gordon was then the world would not have done its work in vain.

Mr. Gordon was laid to rest in St. Andrew's Cemetery, Cardigan, near the bank of a stream, sheltered by trees and shrubbery on either side thus keeping his resting place quiet and peaceful and reminding us of those famous lines from Byron describing the last resting place of Themistocles, the Athenian General:

"No breath of air to break the wave That rolls below the Athenian's grave. That tomb which gleaming o'er First greets the homeward-veering sailor."

The pallbearers were Messrs. Douglas Gordon, Ralph Gordon, Pen Sigworth, Fred Norton, Dan Sanderson and James Shaw. The many beautiful flowers were eloquent testimony to the esteem in which the deceased was held. To enter the ranks so bright, Standing to salute us, In the city of "God," On the beautiful hills of light.
