Dear Jim:—
We have gathered here to-night to pay tribute to you as the Heavyweight champion of Prince Edward Island. The proud pedestal on which you now stand was not gained easily. It was gained by an exhibition of fighting courage which pitted itself against great obstacles and conquered them all. In the elimination contests in which you took part, through the luck of the draw you were forced to battle your way to the top, and your next opponent on two separate occasions sat resting while you fought. But the old Never-say-die spirit asserted itself, and fight fans from all over the Island were cheering your indomitable pluck as you finally came through and established yourself as the challenger for the Island title.

Against the ex-champion, a valiant battler himself, and a man who proved he could take it and come up for more, you showed your real class. When the old dynamite exploded, there simply wasn't anything to it and now you are the champion; the king-pin of a group of husky battlers that were by no means easy to defeat.

Although possessing this ability, you have never been disposed to take advantage of it by picking quarrels or bullying the weak. Your friends all know you, and respect you for a man in whom good nature and a disposition to be friendly is always in evidence. That you will be a worthy champion no one doubts; and we, your friends, who know you best, are equally certain that should the time come when you must face it gallantly and gloriously as you have taken victory. And so we are proud of you. Jim, and in token of our pride and esteem, we ask you to accept this little gift.

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C. N. R. To Observe National Fish Week

MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 25—In recognition of National Fish Week which this year will be observed from September 28 to October 3 travellers on trains of the Canadian National Railways will find on the dining car menus for breakfast, luncheon and dinner a choice selection of tasty fish dishes, according to W. W. Swinden, general superintendent of sleeping, dining and parlor car services of the system.

While fish is served on these dining cars regularly throughout the year special dishes are prepared for the travelling public during National Fish Week which serves to direct attention to one of Canada's chief industries and to encourage the consumption of Canadian fish.

Owing to the serving of fish native to the various regions of Canada, this commodity is becoming increasingly more popular in dining cars of the Canadian National Railways, the demand for cod and haddock predominating in the east, fish from the Great Lakes being in most demand in the more central parts, while the Winnipeg gold eye and Pacific coast species are very popular in the west.

The hotel department of the Canadian National Railways is also participating in this event and are placing on the menus of the several hotels across Canada a wide variety of fishes as well as Canadian oysters.

Cancel Debts To Aid Farmers

REGINA, Sept. 28—(CP)—Premier Patterson of Saskatchewan today announced cancellation of \$75,000,000 in the tax, relief and interest bills of farmers in 138 drought-stricken municipalities of the province.

Affecting between 20,000 and 50,000 farmers, the announcement resulted from discussions with representatives of Canadian mortgage companies and a Liberal party caucus. The Government statement said

farmers generally throughout the province would benefit by reduction in interest on all farm mortgages to six per cent. as from Jan. 1937.

Greatest relief went to drought-stricken municipalities, approximately one half of the 302 municipalities constituting the province.

CARROT RING.

This is a true scuffite type, though at first glance it might not seem so; in place of the usual thick white sauce base, seasoned milk and carrot liquid (thickened with soft breadcrumbs) is used. For added richness, 2 to 3 tablespoons of melted butter might be added before folding in the egg whites—or, if you wished, bacon dripping might be used when the flavor is suitable. Finely chopped cocked ham would be a nice addition to the mixture, when creamed fish (or hard-cooked eggs, if preferred) is to be used to fill the ring.

- 1-2 cups cooked carrots
- 1-2 cup soft breadcrumbs
- 3 well-beaten egg yolks
- 1-2 cup rich milk
- 1-2 cup liquid from carrots
- 1 teaspoon scraped onion
- 1 teaspoon salt
