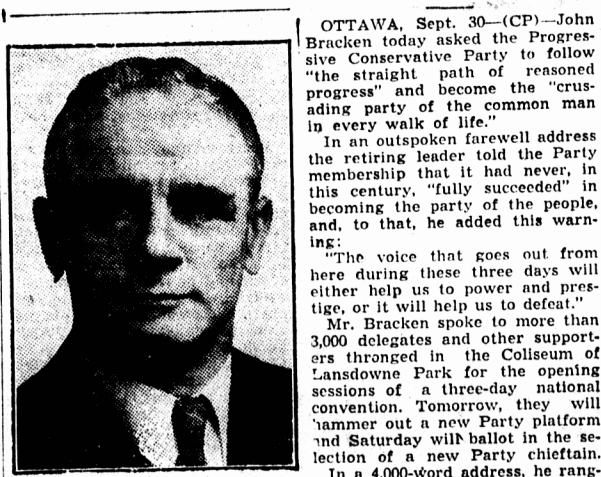

Synopsis: It was fine and very warm over most of the Maritimes Thursday as temperatures rose in the afternoon to the high 60s in Prince Edward Island, to the 70s in Nova Scotia and to 80 in some sections of New Brunswick. Continuing fine weather is expected for the greater part of Friday in Prince Edward Island and the eastern counties of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. However, an area of showers over the Great Lakes and New England will spread into the western sections of the Maritimes, and cloudy skies will result in somewhat lower temperatures.

Forecasts: All times Friday midnight.

Prince Edward Island: Clear becoming cloudy Friday afternoon. Not much change in temperature with light winds. Low early Friday morning and high in the afternoon at Charlottetown 48 and 65.
