IMPRESSIVE FUNERAL.—One of the largest and most impressive funerals seen in Charlottetown for some time, was that of the late Mr. George L. Gaudin, of this City, which took place yesterday afternoon. Deceased was an Odd Fellow and a leading member of the Fire Brigade, being captain of the Sibley Hose Company. The entire Fire Brigade, some forty men in all, attired in their uniforms and a representation of the I. O. O. F. in regalia, paraded as well as citizens generally. The coffin was placed on a salvage corps wagon, which was tastefully draped in black and covered with flowers and was drawn by the firemen. The Fourth Regiment Band headed the cortege, playing the Dead March. The body was conveyed to St. Peter's Cathedral, where the Church of England burial service was sung by the choir, Canon Simpson officiating. Large numbers of citizens viewed the funeral on the way to its last resting place. The deceased was buried in the People's Cemetery, where Canon Simpson said the final words of the Church of England burial service and the Odd Fellows burial ceremony was also conducted. The pall bearers consisted of members of the I. O. O. F. who also belong to the Fire Brigade, viz: Messrs Fred Large, David Bethune, John Martin, Wm. Batt, Gordon Hughes, and Angus McEachern.

BRITONS CELEBRATE NEW YEAR'S DAY WITH RUSH OF RECRUITING.

LONDON, Jan. 3.—New Year's Day was an eventful one in the lives of many Britons. Thousands of men of military age who had been granted temporary leave to make other arrangements for the carrying on of their business were called to the colors, while others who had been doing work of national importance and whose places have now been taken by women or by men over the military age donned the khaki for the first time.

There was a rush at all recruiting offices, and all day long columns of men after having complied with the formalities, were marched off to the depots to commence training. The new railway time tables and fares also came into effect. Numerous trains were cancelled, stations were closed and travellers were called upon to pay a fifty per cent increase in fares.

Except in Scotland, where there is another week's supply of white flour, bakers today under the new order of things started to bake exclusively white wheat or standard bread.

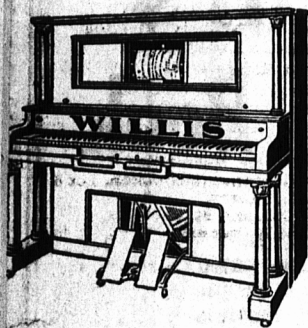
