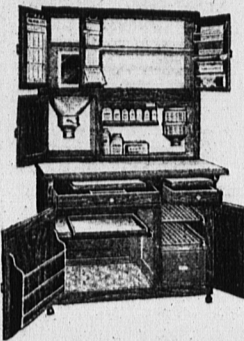

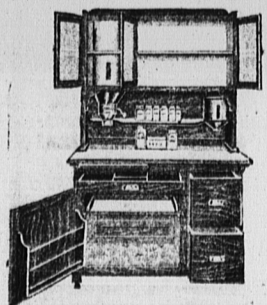

CONVALESCENTS PARADE

TORONTO, Sept. 8.—The boys who have done their bit had their day at the Exhibition this year. A big day when they were reviewed by the Governor General, His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire, and a vast throng of visitors from all parts of the Dominion, who cheered or wept, according to their sex, lined the streets to see them pass in motors.

Every man in "D" Unit of the Military Hospitals Commission Command, paraded. Under the command of Lieut.-Col. Robert S. Wilson, officer commanding, they rode through the streets to the Exhibition Grounds where the Governor, General, His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire, reviewed them.

It was a big day. Canada's interest in her returned heroes was second to no other attraction. The straight-backed trappings of the recruits but the training camps could not compete with the boys with empty sleeves, and the crutch-borne men who had done their turn and come back to find a new place in civilian life.

The day was full of events far removed from the business of getting well, and the men had a great time. When night came they slept in their hospital cots like youngsters instead of War Veterans. All doubt as to Canada's interest in men who come back had been routed.

DUKE INSPECTS WHITBY

The Governor General, His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire, visited the Military Convalescent Hospital at Whitby last week where a recreation hall for the returned soldiers there, has just been completed at the cost of \$55,000.

The hall, which has a seating capacity of 1,500, is built of steel and cement and so constructed that it can be permanently used after the present need for it has passed.

The equipment includes a stage with all fittings necessary for the theatrical productions, movie apparatus, dressing rooms, etc., and will provide a centre for all social activities for the soldiers during the coming winter.

WEST RIVER SOLDIERS' INSTITUTE

The Soldiers' Festival held at West River Bridge Monday, August 27th, was a decided success, despite the many obstacles encountered by the committee in charge. The deaths of two respected citizens of the community, Mr. S. Shaw and Mr. M. McLeod, caused considerable change in plans and the confusion which always follows such change.

The races in which about twenty took part were interesting and exciting. The booths had a busy time as many persons pledged to help the soldiers' cause were absent, thus throwing all the burden on an inadequate number of workers. As a result the dancing booth had no collector during most of the evening, and netted a loss.

The illumination of 300 bull-rushes dipped in oil, Roman candles and colored fires, brought the meeting to an inspiring and spectacular finish. A balance of \$33.05 will be divided between the Red Cross and the Soldiers' Y.M.C.A.
