It is believed the names stamped on their policies are unknown Americans.

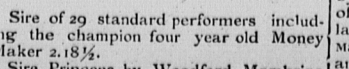

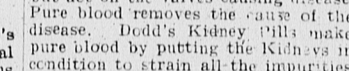
