parts of the front until he was wounded on March 29th, 1918. Lieut. Beer brought home with him a charming English bride.

#### Ivan Mahoney

Pte. Mahoney, Stanley Bridge, enlisted in the 105th Battalion; fought two and a half months in France until October 3th last when he was invalided to England.

#### Frank Campbell

Corporal Frank Campbell of Desable enlisted in Winnipeg in the 200th Battalion; fought two years in France, being most of the time in the Lens front. He left there on October 20th last, being stricken with "flu".

#### George I. Ledwith

Pte. Ledwith is a son of George Ledwith, Charlottetown. He enlisted in Calgary in the 31st Battalion fought a year in France, received a gunshot wound in the right arm at Amiens, August, 1918.

#### Calvin McLeod

Pte. McLeod enlisted in the 125th Draft in Boston, but was unable to get to France before the war was over.

#### J. Mahar

Spr. Mahar of Charlottetown went overseas with the 105th; was transferred to the Engineers, and was 10 months in France, remaining there until December last.

#### Charles McMillan

Pte. McMillan of Wood Islands went to France with the 105th, and fought for twelve months until wounded at Arras on April 24th, where he received a shrapnel wound in both legs.

#### R. L. Cotton

Pte. Cotton of Charlottetown is a son of Mr. W. L. Cotton, the esteemed editor of the Examiner. He was home last winter on a furlough; returned to England and went over to France on the 4th of April with a large detachment of the 105th, being attached to the 2nd Machine Gun Battalion. He received a shrapnel wound in the leg at Cambrai on October 7th. His brother William has been three years in France, and is still overseas.

#### Donald Kennedy

Pte. Kennedy is a son of Mrs. Dun can Kennedy of Charlottetown. He went overseas with the 105th, as Sergeant; reverted to the rank of Pte in order to get to France, where he fought for about 8 months mainly around Arras and Cambrai. On October 14th he was taken very ill with "flu" and pneumonia and sent to the Hospital.

#### Daniel Mathieson

Gunner Mathieson of Forest Hill fought in France with the 8th Siege Battery and was wounded at Cambrai July 1917. He spent six months in hospital, and on recovery went back to the firing line. He was wounded at Amiens and left France last August.

#### Daniel MacKenzie

Pte. MacKenzie, of Whim Road also enlisted in the 226th and also fought in France with the 82nd. He received a bullet wound in the leg at Arras, on Sept. 2nd.

#### F. McCallum

Pte. McCallum of Ocean View—like the two preceding soldiers enlisted in the 236th and was transferred to the 72nd. He fought in France for about the same length of time as the others until he received a bullet in the head at Amiens, Aug. 15th.

#### Raymond Dolron

Pte. Dolron of North Rustico was nine months in France with the Canadian Railway Troops. His brother Mat, who arrived home sometime ago, was also in France, having enlisted in the 159th Infantry Battalion. He was gassed in October.

Ivan Hemphill. Gunner Hemphill is a son of John Hemphill of Georgetown; he left the island with the 5th Siege Draft, under command of Lieut. Beer; was transferred to the 11th Siege Battery in England and fought eight months in France; he received a gunshot wound in the leg at Cambrai last October.

#### H. E. Chiverie

Pte. Chiverie enlisted in the 105th; fought 16 months in France with the 26th; was wounded by a bullet in the left arm at Mourvelet on the Arras front last August.

#### Jerry Quinn

Pte. Quinn of Charlottetown is a grandson of Mrs. John Morgan. He enlisted in the 105th Battalion fought; 16 months in France, saw service at Passchendaele, Hill 70, Arras and other battles. He received a machine gun bullet through both legs at Arras, last August; was six months in hospital.

#### Neil McDougall

Corporal Macdougall of Grand River, Prince County, enlisted in the 105th, fought 19 months in France with the 14th Battalion, was twice wounded, first at Vimy Ridge on April 9th, 1917, and again at Arras on August 29th, 1918, where he lost an eye and sustained other injuries.

#### W. G. Shilker

Private Shilker of O'Leary, fought in France for twelve months with the 55th Battalion. He was twice wounded, first at Courcellette in September, 1916, where he received a gunshot wound in the back, and again at Arras on August 29th, 1918, by a bullet in the left arm.

#### L. Tcherriault

Pte. L. Tcherriault of Bloomfield, was six months in France with the R. C. R's and was wounded in the thigh at Cambrai in September last.

#### Russell White

Pte. Russell White of Stanchel, fought six months in France with the 2nd C. N. R's. Received a flesh wound at Cambrai on September 29th 1918.

#### F. D. McKay

Pte. McKay of New London, enlisted in the 105th; was transferred to another unit, and fought six months in France, being wounded by shrapnel at Arras on August 27th, 1918.

#### G. C. McLeod

Pte. McLeod of Wigmore Road went overseas with the 5th General Hospital. On his return to England he took a position as Orderly on board the Essequibo. He arrived last night on a short visit to his relatives.

#### Albert Arsenault

Pte. Arsenault of St. Gilberts enlisted in the 105th; fought seven months in France, was wounded in the right arm at Cambrai, October 8th, 1918.

#### Edwin Lejeune

Pte. Lejeune enlisted in the 105th fought ten months in France, and was wounded at Arras.

#### Hugh S. Macdonald

Private Macdonald is a brother of Captain J. W. Macdonald of Charlottetown. He enlisted in British Columbia with the 7th Battalion, went overseas with the First Contingent; has been in France since February 15th, 1915, and was in Germany after the armistice was signed.

#### Charles Harris

Pte. Harris, of Rosemeath, enlisted in the 105th; fought 6 months in France with the 26th, and was wounded by shrapnel at Arras, August 8th.

#### Hugh McPhee

Pte. McPhee, of De Gros Marsh, enlisted in the 105th; fought seven months with the 75th; was wounded by shrapnel in the right arm at Arras last September.

#### Joe McPherson

Pte. McPherson enlisted in the 105th; fought 22 months in France with the 13th; was wounded in the right arm by shrapnel at Cambrai last October.

#### Daniel Jay

Pte. Jay, Peake's Station, enlisted in Halifax with the 26th; fought 9 months in France, and was gassed at Passchendaele.

#### Dennis McDonald

Gunner McDonald is a son of Mr. W. G. McDonald, of Vernon River. He went overseas with Major McKinnon's Ammunition Column; was transferred to the 4th column and fought 26 months in France.

#### S. A. Young

Private Young is a step-son of Mr. Edward Delorie, Brudenell River. He enlisted in the 105th; fought 21 months in France; was twice wounded, 1st, in the arm at Vimy Ridge, by a bullet, and again by shrapnel in the thigh at Amiens.

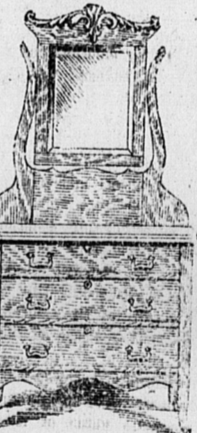

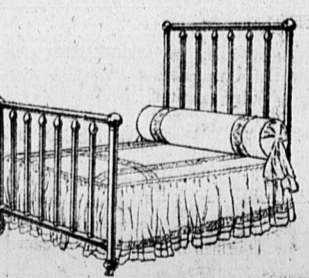

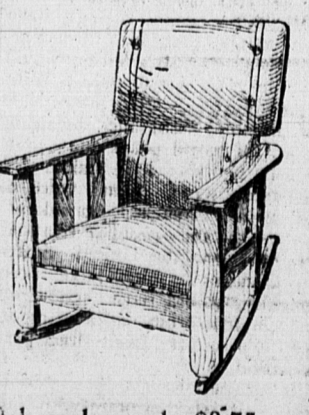
