The prospectus of the Summer School of Science for the Atlantic Provinces of Canada in which the teachers of Prince Edward Island participate, will be held at Sackville, New Brunswick, from July 7th to 24th, 1908. The prospectus says:—Sackville is situated in Westmorland County, N.B., on a point of land which juts out into the "miles on miles of marsh" that lie on three sides of the town. Through the marsh, which lies east of the town flows the Tantramar River, which twists hither and thither as if it had forgotten its way and at its entrance Chignecto Basin. Across the marshes lies the dark green silt of Fort Beauséjour. The Tantramar has been made famous by the writings of Chas. G. D. Roberts, from whom the above quotations have been taken. A drive for miles on these marshes, in July, with nothing but a sea of wind blown grass on all sides, with ridges of hills in the distance, will be one never to be forgotten. On this drive, Point De Bute the old stone houses, and Beauséjour with its bastions, trenches, tower magazine and underground chamber, can be visited. Returning home, Coles' Island, a sand mound in the marshes, will be passed. Middle Sackville, a busy little village, lies about two miles northwest of the town. South-west of the town is Westcock, the scene of the early life of Chas. G. D. Roberts. J. D. Seaman, Charlottetown is the Secretary-Treasurer of the Summer School of Science.
