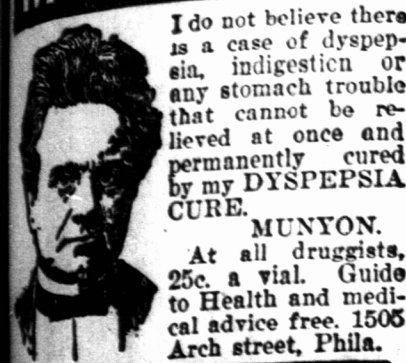

Sudden Death of Mr. J. D. Mason.

WITH REGRET THE GUARDIAN chronicles this morning the death of Mr. James Duncan Mason which took place at his residence about ten o'clock yesterday morning. Mr. Mason had recently suffered from an attack of the grippe but had apparently recovered. He was in his room dressing himself, was partly dressed when his daughter heard him fall and ran to him, but he expired in a few minutes. Dr. Dickie was called but life was extinct. The cause of death was apoplexy. Mr. Mason was born in Durham, England 73 years ago. He emigrated to the Province early in life and went into business with his uncle Andrew Duncan, shipbuilder. Subsequently the business merged into Duncan, Mason and Co. general merchants. The business was afterwards conducted by the late Mr. Mason until the seventies. Since that time he has led a retired life. Mr. Mason took an active interest in fraternal societies, was a prominent Mason and filled many of the offices with acceptance. He was also a member of the Caledonia Club. A widow, two sons Robert and James, and two daughters Mrs. Arch. Irwin and Miss Ethel, who resides at home, are surviving relatives.

PRESIDENT Schurman, of Cornell University, speaking at Buffalo, recently said: "The Filipinos have some excellent virtues. They are exceedingly cleanly and also exceedingly temperate. 'You have brought us the blessings of civilization,' said one of them, 'and you have lined our most beautiful street in Manila, the Escotta with 500 saloons.' THE EDITOR'S MAIL.

For Better Streets and Sidewalks.

SIR:—Believing that the present condition of the Streets and Sidewalks of the City demands the immediate attention of the City Council with the view of putting the same in a more permanent and satisfactory state I beg to address you on the matter.

Since my election as City Councillor and assuming the position of Chairman of the Finance Committee I have scrutinized Civic Accounts carefully with the view of ascertaining if more money than usual could not possibly be spared for the maintenance and macadamizing of the streets. I find in making up the estimates of expenditure for the current year that after providing for the different departments of Civic Government and other necessary expenditure the amount left for macadamizing will be comparatively small considering the large amount of work to be undertaken.

I firmly believe that the general desire of the citizens is that the principal streets of the City should be macadamized at once. To do this is impossible out of ordinary revenue. We must therefore issue debentures if the work is to be done at once and if we are to enjoy the benefits of improved streets.

To macadamize all the principal streets and relay some of those already macadamized, which is urgently needed, will cost in the vicinity of \$30,000 and in obtaining authority for the City to raise this amount for macadamizing purposes I would suggest the advisability of asking for an additional amount for the laying of permanent sidewalks. These debentures would of course only be issued from time to time as the work would proceed and the money be required.

I am satisfied we will require no further taxation to meet the interest of these debentures but before taking further action in the matter I would like to get the views of some of our leading citizens.

Opposed to Mr. Haszard's Plan.

SIR,—In Mr. Haszard's communication the annually recurring deficits under the present administration and the one immediately preceding it, he advocates a reduction of the present Legislature. First, this would save but little as their remuneration is small—the smallest of any Province of the Dominion. Secondly it wouldn't work with the smoothness and harmony of the present system as if you reduce the numbers to one for each district, it would cause racial, sectional and religious difficulties—difficulties obvious to the most superficial observer, causing unpleasantness, distrust and disunion feelings which unfortunately politicians have often aroused for effecting of their own selfish purposes. Again if you make the district larger and members fewer, more labor and expenses would be incurred in a campaign, the poor man would be deterred from entering the field, and more remuneration would be expected, defeating the very purpose of the movement. Again, the plan of taking the best men from each party sounds well in theory, but has never worked in practice. There would be a vast diversity of opinion as to whom the best men were and when found and placed to work they would soon divide themselves into, at least, two hostile camps, each with a different plan for the good government of the country. Under existing conditions, and under conditions which have existed for many years, party Government is a necessity. In that Empire which we proudly call the Mother Land, whose constitution, whose institutions and whose laws are founded on the experience of a thousand years, and in all matters political and

Judicial is a pattern and an example to the nations, party government has existed in all its peculiarities, its distinctiveness and of its purity for the last two and a half centuries, and her greatest historian says "that though both parties have often seriously erred, England could have spared neither". Further, the dawn of greatness may be said to have commenced when her statesmen ranked themselves into two separate and distinct parties, each of which have alternately governed the country till the present day. Further, coalition Governments have generally been short lived in these Provinces as well as elsewhere, the individual members naturally gravitating towards their native and natural political bodies. As an example the coalition Government of this Island which soon broke to fragments, each member soon arraying himself in the habiliments of his respective party. Witness the coalition Governments of New Brunswick and British Columbia which are fast marching into line under the party banner. Again, witness the collapse of the Patrons of Industry, whose platform was good, and whose purposes were grand. After a short existence and promising career, they quietly disbanded, fell again into the party ranks, and voluntarily kept time to the party music. For these and many other reasons, I think it must be conceded, that a reduction of the members would be most injudicious, a coalition of the best men impracticable.
