The Franco-Canadian Trade

OTTAWA, April 3.—Canada's trade balance with France continues favorable, and there has been a marked increase of trade, according to the report of Hercule Barre, Canadian Trade Commissioner in Paris.

Exports to France in 1924 are valued at 482,826,000 francs, as against imports from that country of 333,246,000 francs.

In 1923 Canada exported to France goods worth 373,692,000 francs and imported from that country 183,457,000 francs worth. The increase in trade is partly attributed to the treaty of commerce executed between the two countries and the propaganda work of the Canada Exhibition train in that country.

Canada Sells 258 Craft Since 1918

OTTAWA, April 3.—When L. H. Martell, member of Parliament for Hants, asked for a return showing how many boats had been sold since the armistice, with full particulars of the money involved, he started a list which today reached the 258 craft, were sold.

These comprise everything from an obsolete cruiser to a canoe. Some fetched tens of thousands of dollars, others brought as low as \$1.25. Even the Department of Health had sold one boat and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police the Department of Fisheries made 157 of its 183 sales were of confiscated craft.

BELFAST, April 3.—Polling for election of Ulster's new parliament opened today in glorious weather. The first results are not expected to be known before tomorrow night.
