recently in the interests of the movement for the organization of an association for the prevention of tuberculosis in Carleton county. An afternoon meeting was held in the council chamber, at which Col. F. H. J. Dibblee presided, and E. W. Blair was secretary. Dr. Walker spoke for an hour and a half. The doctor told of the progress of the work in Nova Scotia. He thought that the work should come from the public at large, for it was a work for the betterment of all the people. This was money for the prosecution of the campaign of education, which should start in the schools. He pointed out that annually there were 2,500 deaths from consumption in the maritime provinces, one quarter of the deaths in the dominion, although the maritime provinces had only one-seventh of the population. The evening meeting was held in the new theatre.

GEN BOOTH BACK TO WORK.

LONDON, Oct. 30.—Gen Booth, head of the Salvation Army, has resumed his activities, appearing, for the first time since he underwent an operation, at a largely attended meeting of Salvationists at Clapton, which he addressed with his customary cheerful energy. He has lost the use of one eye, and the other is imperfect, but his doctor has told him it may last for five years.

ENGLISH AVIATORS. INSURE AEROPLANES.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—Insurance for those who go up in flying machines is the latest form of policy brought out by an enterprising Scottish Casualty Insurance Company. The United States, Consul at Dunfermline, Scotland, reports today to the Bureau of Commerce and Labor that the corporation in question has recognized the need for insuring aviators. The innovation is looked upon with distrust by other insurance concerns of Great Britain, Lloyd's declining to issue such insurance on the operators, the machinery or structure of aeroplanes or dirigible balloons.

Another phase of insurance relative to the new science of aeronautics has been put out by a well-known Marine Insurance Company of England. This policy appears to be considerably in advance of the time for it, contemplates protection of the lives and property of innocent persons who may be individually injured, or whose possessions may be damaged by falling aeroplanes.

In view of the many aviators who are entering the field of aviation, the rates naturally would be supposed to be so high as to be almost prohibitive. However, the rate of the policy and its indemnity provisions are surprisingly liberal. He adds, that it is generally recognized in Great Britain that an entirely new and perhaps profitable field for insurance activity has been opened up by the introduction of the aeroplane.

MARITIME BOARD HAS ITS USES AFTER ALL.

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 30.—At a meeting of the Board of Trade tonight a variety of matters pertaining to the welfare of the city were discussed and the city council is to be memorialized to make a move in the direction of constructing permanent sidewalks, improving streets and putting a stop to exporting in public places.

In reporting from the Maritime Board of Trade, one of the delegates, J. T. Hawke, said St. John and Halifax appeared to select the Maritime Board at the battle ground for the settling of differences between the two cities.

ANNUAL TRANSFER OF TROOPS TO PHILIPPINES.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—Wholesale shifting of the United States troops in the Philippines, Alaska and several other stations in the country proper was announced at the War Department yesterday. It was necessary vaguely by the annual transfer of troops to and from the Philippines, it will require more than ten months to accomplish the change ordered after the shift begins next January.

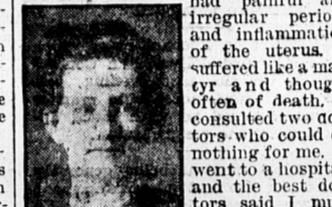
LIMITS PAPAL AUDIENCES.

C.P.R. WAIT FOR STATEMENT FROM HALIFAX.

MONTEAL, October 30.—No information is forthcoming as yet in regard to propositions of the Halifax board of trade as to the building of an extension of the Canadian Pacific from St. John to Halifax. Sir Thomas Shaughnessy and Vice-President MeNeil returned yesterday from Quebec, but declined to discuss the matter. It was stated that so far reaching a matter becomes at once a matter of policy which demands consideration before any action is taken. It was pointed out that so far there is nothing for the executive of the Canadian Pacific to consider, the matter not being officially before them, and that such matters could scarcely be discussed on the basis of newspaper despatches. The only statement that the executive heads would make was: "We understand that a committee had been appointed by the Halifax board of trade to consult before us. When the Halifax Pacific and lay their propositions the management of the Canadian people do this, it will be time enough for us to announce our policy."
