IN MEMORIAM

MR. JOHN J. GILLIS.

John J. Gillis died at his home in Clermont on May 15 after a short illness of la grippe. Mr. Gillis was born at Clermont, P. E. I. in 1831, and there he lived until death removed him from the scenes of a practical, useful life. He was by profession a farmer, and by thrift and industry found and maintained a prosperous home. He lived a strictly moral life and died full of years and good works. His wife (nee Ellen McGillivray) predeceased him eight years. The members of the family still living are: Joseph R., Alaska; Mary A., trained nurse, New York; John B., New Brunswick; Ellie at home; Daniel M., Honolulu; Sister St. Lucius, Providence, R. I. His funeral was held on Friday morning to St. Mary's Church, Indian River and a Requiem Mass was sung by Rev. J. G. McLean. Mr. Gillis was a man of exemplary character, quiet in disposition yet of a sociable nature that made his presence always acceptable. His neighbors and friends deeply mourn his death and earnestly sympathize with the bereaved ones in their hour of sorrow.

MR. CHARLES MACHON

Four months ago Mr. Charles Machon of Guernsey Cove, was stricken with paralysis on one side. His condition from the first was regarded as very unpromising. He gradually weakened, and as gradually the disease crept into full possession of its victim, and on May 14th, 1918 the soul of Mr. Machon left the tabernacle of clay. The deceased was born at Guernsey Cove, P. E. I. on August 10th 1841 and in that community all his life was spent. He was a farmer, prosperous and industrious as the condition of his farm would abundantly indicate. He was twice married. His first wife was Miss Elizabeth McInnis of Eldon, P. E. I. To this union were born three sons, Henry in Alta; Benj. and Herbert in Boston. In 1888 marriage was contracted with Miss Elizabeth Tweedy of Vernon River a sister of the late Mrs. D. P. Irving. One daughter survives from this union—Mrs. Hampden Hawkins of White Sands, P. E. I. Mrs. Machon also survives to mourn the loss of a husband kind and considerate. There is one brother, James in Texas and three sisters, Mrs. John Harris, White Sands; Mrs. Wm. Howe, Guernsey Cove and Mrs. Davy in the Western States.

The funeral services were conducted by the pastor of the deceased, Rev. E. Weeks on May 17th and was attended by many of the friends and neighbors of the surrounding communities. Interment was made at Murray Harbor Cemetery. (Patriot please copy)

UNDERDRAINAGE

The results of an experiment in drainage conducted at the Experimental Station, Ste. Anne de la Pocatiere, Quebec, teach that good soil drainage is a practise that is of great importance in these days when the maximum production of crops is required from every farm.

In this experiment a certain area of level land, uniform in every way, was taken and divided into two fields, "A" and "B." Field "A" was under-drained by means of three-inch tile placed at a depth of four feet and thirty feet apart. Field "B" was not tile drained, but had perfect surface drainage. These two fields were cultivated and treated exactly alike; rotation, manure, methods of cultivation, choice and quality of seed, etc., being the same in each case.

Close observation has shown that larger yields were obtained on the tile drained area each year than on that which was only surface drained. The difference was rather small the year following the laying of the tile, was larger the following year, and became quite marked the third year. It was most marked among crops like corn which require more warmth.

In 1917 the crop of corn on the tile drained area was more than twice as great as that on the undrained field, the exact difference being 108 per cent. Wheat yielded 72 per cent. more and hay showed a 20 per cent. increase. It might be noted however that the season of 1917 was late and damp which gave more of an advantage to the drained land. In a normal season the results in favor of the tile-drained land might not be quite so marked.

The increase in crop yields secured is an important one, but it is not the only good result of tile drainage. After three years the experiment has proved that the soil on the tile-drained area has become much more porous and more mellow than the soil which was only surface drained. It can be cultivated more easily and can be worked and sown earlier in the spring.

There is no question but what just as good results can be secured from tile draining in this province as have been secured at the Experimental Station at Ste. Anne de la Pocatiere. The single advantage of earlier seeding is sufficient to commend this practise to those farmers who have wet land. Our springs are often late and the growing season is comparatively short. A difference of a week or so at seeding may mean the difference between a good crop and a half crop or none at all.
