ISRAEL OPPRESSED IN EGYPT.

Exod. 1: 1-14. Memory verses, 8, 9, 13, 14.

GOLDEN TEXT.

God heard their moaning, and God remembered his covenant.—Exod. 2: 24.

Place.—The land of Goshen, on the border between Egypt and the wilderness.

LESSON HELP.

The word Exodus means departure, and the book is so named because it gives the account of the Israelites leaving Egypt. While they were slaves, and did not suffer severe oppression until the later years of their stay there. Some of them were warriors, and some were skilled workmen and they prospered. While they had become somewhat entangled in idolatry, yet they had not forgotten the faith of their fathers.

1. "These are the names"—The heads or chiefs of the tribes are recounted, and are called in Acts 7: 8, the twelve patriarchs.
2. "Seventy souls"—This was the number of those who had come into Egypt and had increased to a great multitude. The number is stated that the increase in Egypt might appear to be the more wonderful. It is good not to forget the small beginnings from which come great prosperity.

3. "And Joseph died"—A statement in three words, but how much it meant to those of his kindred who survived him! Little did they know, in their grief, what trials were in store for them. "And all his brethren"—When Joseph, who was the stay of the family, went the thero followed apace.

4. "The children of Israel were fruitful"—A figure from the seed which multiplied a hundredfold. "Increased abundantly"—That is, swarmed even like the fish of the Nile. The land yielded much food, and hence the population increased; and then, too, as the Israelites were somewhat isolated from the Egyptians, they were able to develop the features of their national life.

5. "A new king"—A new dynasty, "which knew not Joseph," nor cared for him. Not that Joseph had been dead so long as to be forgotten, but the new ruler did not care for one whose services to a former ruler had been of such value. Man has sometimes a short memory for favours received, and it is best to serve God, for he is not unrighteous to forget our work and labour of love.

6. "Are more and mightier than we"—They did not, as yet, outnumber the Egyptians, but they grew so fast as to alarm the ruler, for, though slaves, they were of a hostile race and religion. The tyrant is ever fearful of those who are forced to live under him.

7. "Let us deal wisely with them"—The ruler saw that there was growing up in his empire a hostile nation who might join against him with a foreign foe and overturn his empire. (1) The growth of Israel is the grief of Egypt, because Egypt was a tyrant instead of a friend, and (2) it was not to deal wisely with them when it was planned to deal wickedly. Sin is folly, and oppression is far from wisdom.

8. "Taskmasters"—That is, chiefs of tribute. The word was applied to the officer who had charge of the captives who were sent to making bricks. The officer who was one of high rank, and had overseers under him. "Balls of mud"—Magazines for food and ammunition of various kinds, as the Egyptians had a standing army, and many slaves were employed on the public works. "Pithon and Raameses" were two cities about twenty-four miles apart, and their names set forth the sun worship of the Egyptians.

9. "They made their lives bitter with hard bondage"—They were set to the roughest and hardest kind of work. An immense number of bricks made from the mud of the Nile was used in the public buildings, and the work of irrigating the fields was most toilsome. The purpose was to keep the Israelites poor, to break their spirits by long, hard work, and to make them like beasts of burden. All proved to be in vain, for, though the tyrant rules, it can be for a season only.

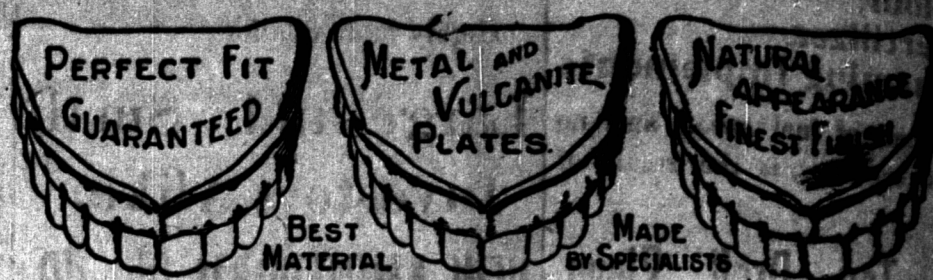

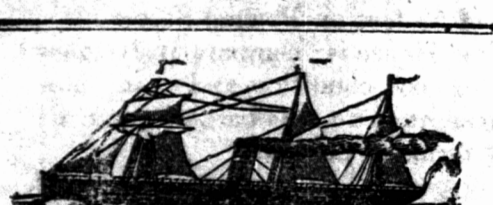
