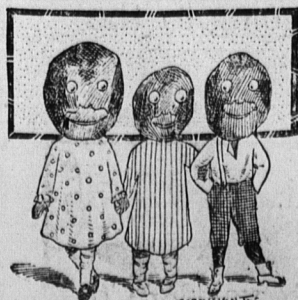

The Canadian Countryman of September 24th, has a good deal to say about the markets.
In referring to the possibility of the Dardanelles being forced at an early date it says that if this should be done there will be a temporary drop in prices but that the traders have pretty well discounted the possibilities and the drop will not be great. There is however a prospect of too much wheat being rushed on the market at once. Anything that would regulate this would help to keep up the prices. Ontario markets are steady at last week's prices. Oats have dropped a cent or two and the prospect for an oat market is good only through the feeding of it to livestock. There is a general feeling that the prices for oats will rule low. At present the local markets of Ontario are paying about 37c. a bushel for oats. Last week Ontario flour dropped to about \$3.80 and this week the Manitoba article followed going to \$5.75. The price of bran still keeps up, car loadings are still quoted at \$27.00 per ton. As however, there was a large amount of wheat injured in Ontario, millfeeds should go considerably lower.

WOODSTOCK BOY MAKES A BIG FORTUNE

WOODSTOCK, N. B., Sept. 28.—Dolph McLean, a Seattle, Wash., electrical engineer, and his business partner, D. W. Lapp, have secured a contract under the terms of which the British War Department has agreed to purchase outright a wireless telegraph invented by McLean for \$3,250,000.

Dolph McLean, 26 years of age, is the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. R. J. McLean, of Woodstock. He studied electrical engineering here at graduation from the General Electric Co. of Boston. Coming home, he conducted a successful business and for two years he worked here in his spare time on his invention. He went to Saskatoon three years ago, thence to Seattle and has for five years been perfecting his invention, which promises to make him wealthy.

HAY.—Baled hay is a little easier and is quoted in Montreal at \$17 to \$18, and at local points throughout Ontario unbaled clover hay is changing from \$6 to \$8 a ton.

POULTRY AND EGGS.—The big exportations of last week were followed this week by still larger ones. The Old Country will probably take large quantities which they formerly received from Continental sources. The advance in prices may be expected. They have already gone up one cent at Toronto and two cents at Montreal. At local points in Ontario the following prices were quoted for Saturday last:—Belleville 22c. Woodstock, 21c. Port Hope, 19c. London and Berlin, 25c. per dozen.

BUTTER.—Butter markets are in good shape and a half a cent higher than a week ago. The Old Country market would take the stored supplies in Canada if shipping space could be found to handle it. Some has already gone forward on bottoms bound for Glasgow. Receipts here are very heavy on Montreal market. The rise in price however brought in a very considerable amount of butter from the West, and Alberta butter of the very best quality is being laid down in Montreal at 25c. a pound. The butter boards however sold on the 11th at from 27c. to 28c. per lb.

CHEESE.—The Cheese trade shows improvement but deliveries have been very heavy. Montreal receipts for the week ending September 15th were 73-298 boxes. At the Cheese Boards on September 15th the quotations ranged from 14c. to 14 1/2c. per lb.

LIVESTOCK.—There is nothing to report in the live stock situation. Hog receipts are light and the market firm. Prices same as last week. The receipts of sheep and lambs are liberal and the prices dropped about 25c. The horse trade is about as usual. There are horses to sell but few buyers. Old Country buyers are however operating to a limited extent.

According to official statistics for the seven months ending July 31st, the Dominion of Canada exported to the British market 552,139,000 lbs. of bacon, or little more than three times the amount exported in the corresponding months of 1914. As regards Cheese, Canada in the same period supplied 44,015,000 lbs., as compared with 33,000,000 lbs. in the same period last year. In the campaign for economy which has been backed by the Press of Great Britain, the public are urged to eat more cheese and less meat, as it contains weight for weight more nourishment than meat does. The fall in the price of cheese has led to its much wider use. The fact that the government took to issuing cheese rations to the soldiers was the reason for sending up prices to an unexpected point, but when the ration of the home troops continued and the supplies went only to the expeditionary forces the price at once fell. Bacon is showing a tendency to increase in price chiefly due to the shortage in supplies from Denmark. Before the war there was an average consignment of fifty per cent Danish pigs weekly, now the weekly average is about twenty-five thousand, with a prospect of still further shortage. The normal output will not likely be restored until the end of the war. First class Canadian bacon is quickly cleared from the market, but there is a great deal going over showing signs of having been too long on the journey and is being sold at a loss.

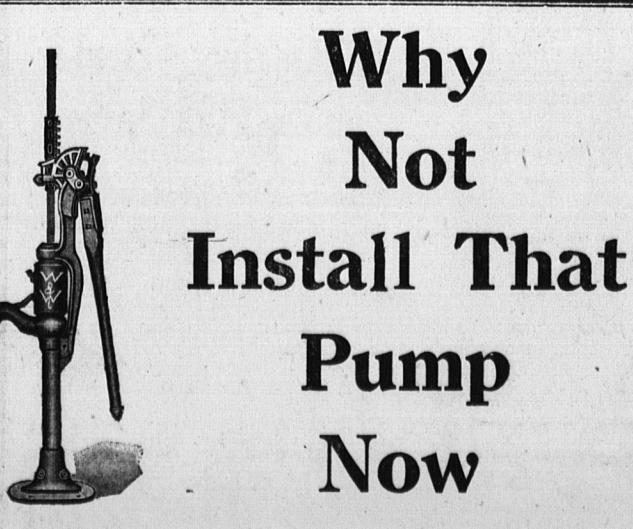

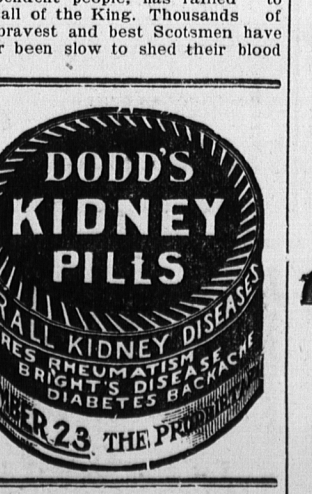
