REV. MR. RAMSAY FOR MONCTON.—The Moncton Transcript says: Rev. J. A. Ramsay, of New Glasgow, N.S., will succeed Rev. T. Porter Drumm as minister of St. John's Presbyterian church in this city. Some time after the pulpit of St. John's church became vacant in consequence of the acceptance by Rev. Mr. Drumm of a call to a Newark, N.J., church, the congregation of the Moncton church extended a unanimous call to Rev. J. A. Ramsay, pastor of St. Andrew's church, New Glasgow. This call was considered by the Presbytery of Pictou on the first of July and Mr. Ramsay's congregation turned out in large numbers to protest against his removal from New Glasgow. Mr. Ramsay asked for ten days to consider the matter and the Pictou Presbytery met again yesterday when the Reverend gentleman accepted the call to the Moncton church. Rev. Mr. Ramsay, who is a native of P. E. I., has been minister of St. Andrew's church in New Glasgow for nearly twelve years, and his labors in the Nova Scotia town have been very successful. That he is very much liked by the congregation of the Moncton was evidenced by the strong and united effort to retain him as their minister.

NEW PRESIDENT OF CONFERENCE.—Of the Rev. H. E. Thomas, the new President of the Methodist Conference, the Wesleyan says:—Rev. Herbert E. Thomas, pastor of the Methodist church at Sackville, N. B., is the new president of the N. B. and P. E. I. Conference. He was born in St. John forty-five years ago, and was educated in the city schools and at Mt. Allison. He was received on probation for the ministry in 1896 and ordained in 1900. He has been stationed at Stanley, Sunny Brae, Lindsay, Campbellton, Moncton (Wesley Memorial), Charlottetown, St. John (Carleton), and is now in his fourth year at Sackville. Mr. Thomas offered for military service and was appointed chaplain, with the rank of captain, and went overseas in 1915, but on account of impaired health was obliged to return in a year's time. The new president has had considerable experience in official Conference work as assistant and journal secretary, financial secretary and chairman of District and general of several General Conferences, so that he came to the duties of his office with such good training as to make him a very efficient presiding officer. Mr. Thomas is a speaker of more than usual force and eloquence. He has taken a keen interest in temperance and moral reform questions and has the courage of his convictions. He not only has an unquestioned but also wields a facile pen and has contributed sprightly and able short articles to papers and magazines. We extend to Mr. Thomas our hearty congratulations and best wishes for a very prosperous Conference year.

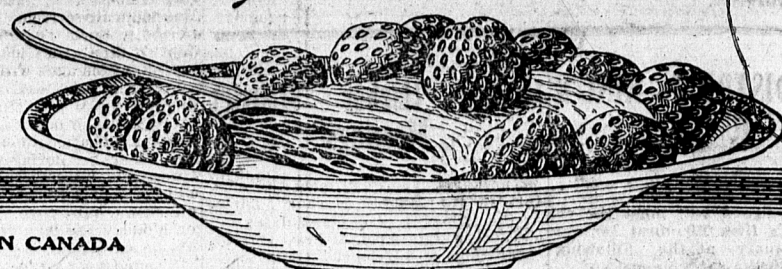

KING'S DAUGHTERS. The St. John Globe of July 9th says: The ninth triennial convention of the International Order of the King's Daughters and Sons, Dominion branch was opened this afternoon in the King's Daughter's Guild, Prince William street, with the president of the Dominion branch, Miss A. M. Brown, Toronto, in the chair. Miss E. L. Thorne, Fredericton, Canadian member of the Central Council, presided at the provincial convention which was held this morning in the King's Daughters Guild. Miss Thorne was re-elected president of the provincial branch; Miss Jean Cooper, Fredericton, secretary and Mrs. George Dishart, treasurer. The Charlottetown members present were Mrs. Edward Chandler and Miss Jennie Turner. Mrs. A. Pierce Crockett, president of the St. John City Union, delivered an address of welcome this afternoon, and Mrs. Chandler, P. E. I., responded. Greetings were received from Dominion and Provincial officers and reports of the Dominion and Provincial president and treasurer, respectively, were received.

A joint political meeting was held at North Wiltshire on Friday night, addressed by the candidates of both parties Messrs L. L. Jenkins, Chester McLure, Messrs Hughes and LePage. There was a very large representation of the voters of the district present. The meeting was strongly in favor of the Liberal-Conservative candidates Messrs Jenkins and McLure. Mr. McLure was the first speaker and dealt with the political issues of the day in a sound business like manner, placing before the meeting plain facts and figures which could not but make an impression on the electors. Mr. McLure, as at all the meetings so far, has shown the financial condition of the province in such a light that the opposition candidates have not been able to refute his statements accordingly the opposition candidates are bringing in each night some new men in an endeavour to break down these clear cut figures.

Mr. McLure also dealt with education, transportation and agriculture issues in such a manner that one would consider him a politician of many years standing.

His pleasing manner and cool pointed reasoning, is having a telling effect at each meeting. He had many friends in this district before entering the campaign and one thing is certain, he is now adding to his list daily.

Mr. LePage was the next speaker and in reply to Mr. McLure made a short speech, evading the financial question. He stated that he would leave that issue to other men. He also stated that the roads in the southern part of the district were in perfect condition which was a big concession on the part of a Liberal.

Mr. Jenkins then took the platform and spoke for over an hour. He was quite at home and judging by the

hearty reception given him by his neighbours and friends, Mr. Jenkins will receive the largest vote ever polled in North Wiltshire.

Dealing with every issue in a masterly manner, Mr. Jenkins dealt with the financial issues of the province and the splendid manner in which the Arsenal Government had handled the funds of the province. He took Mr. Hughes to account for his many mis-statements of the previous evening. Mr. Jenkins explained fully what had been done under Liberal and Conservative rule for the good roads of the province. He also dealt with the erroneous statements made by Mr. Hughes on the floor of the House when Mr. Jenkins was not there to reply, but with the arguments laid down Mr. Hughes was made to feel that his small politics were mean and low. Mr. Jenkins is assured of

the hearty support of this poll at the election on the 24th.

Mr. Hughes followed meekly with replies to Mr. McLure's arguments but failed to impress his audience or to combat the arguments made by Mr. Jenkins.

Mr. McLure was again given an opportunity to speak and contradicted the report made by the Patriot at the opening of the campaign which Mr. Hughes acknowledged he had reported to the Patriot. Dealing with the increased gratitude to returned men Mr. McLure placed himself on record at North Wiltshire as well as at the other meetings which he attended with so much success.

Short speeches were also made by Mr. Inman and Mr. McDuff. The Liberal Conservatives know how the poll at North Wiltshire will go on the 24th.
