DUCHESS, RED CROSS NURSE WEDS MAJOR FITZGERALD

LONDON, Oct. 22.—Millicent, Duchess of Sutherland, who recently went to the war as head of the Red Cross Hospital and Major Percy Desmond Fitzgerald of the Eleventh Hussars, were married last week at Rochampton. The duchess has returned to her Red Cross work in France.
The Duchess of Sutherland is the fourth daughter of the Earl of Rosslyn. She married, in 1884, the Duke of Sutherland, who died in 1913. She is deeply interested in social questions. Major Fitzgerald was born in 1878 and has served in South Africa. He was decorated for distinguished service in Ladysmith and the Transvaal.

FOX NOTES.—Messrs T. R. Cook, secretary-treasurer, and Wm. Kearney, vice-president, of the Murray River Permanent Silver Black Fox Company, were in the city yesterday attending a meeting of the directors of the company. Colonel Emery, of Newport, Vermont, was also present at the meeting. The company recently took delivery of four pairs of excellent foxes from the Seal River ranch, and there are now in their new ranch 12 pairs of foxes. This ranch is one of the finest in the province. Mr. J. Stanley Wedlock, of the Canada Fox Exchange and Investment Company, and Mrs. Wedlock are on a few weeks' visit to Boston and other American cities.—There are in the office of the Canada Fox Exchange some splendid photographs, taken by Mr. Bayer, photographer, of Charlottetown, of the magnificent ranch of the Canada-Atlantic Fox and Fur Company. The photograph gives a panoramic view of the extensive area of this ranch, which is probably the largest in the world.—Shareholders of the Seal River Fox Company yesterday received the prospectus for the amount of their dividends. The dividend declared by this company is 15 per cent.

THE ADVANCING PRICE OF FURS

Apart from those who are intimately acquainted with the fur market, very few people have but a very faint idea of the increase that has taken place in the price of all kinds of furs during the last twenty or thirty years. Everyone knows all about the rise in the price of everything that pertains to general living, but as furs in a way are considered luxuries, slight attention has been called to them. Still are they not as much required, and should be counted as many other necessary articles of living. In cold countries especially, people cannot well do without furs, and most every one manages some way or other to become possessed of some kind of furs.

While the pelt of the silver black fox is regarded as one of the most expensive of all bearing animals, there are others that have advanced more in proportion. The pine martin has had probably the greatest increase.

The average percentage of increase during the twenty years from 1892 to 1911 over the average of the previous ten years from 1882 to 1891, was very marked, and a total increase in the price of this animal's fur was 580 p. c., next to that the Fisher increased in price 430 p. c. The White Fox 350 p. c. The Silver Black Fox and the Mink 300 p. c. The Red Fox 245 p. c. The Sea Otter, 240 p. c. The Muskrat, 230 p. c.

The Lynx 200 p. c. While the skunk, cross fox and blue fox, averaged about 125 p. c. This proves very conclusively that either furs are in much greater demand of the fur bearing denizens of the wilds have been greatly depopulated. The latter condition has probably the greatest bearing on the subject, augmented to a large extent by the first.

However this may be, the high prices obtained for all kinds of furs, has been responsible for the creating of the great industry which is now being conducted throughout Canada—the raising of fur-bearing animals in captivity. Whether in time to come the prices will still be higher or find a lower level, depends to a great extent upon the success of the different industries, and whether the demand for furs continues to increase. Judging from the past it is reasonable to suppose, that until a number of years have passed, the demand will be considerably in advance of the supply.

It has been demonstrated that fox farming can be carried on very profitably even if the price of furs were hundreds of per cent. lower than now, so that it is a foregone conclusion that the fur farming industry will grow with rapid strides until it embraces every kind of fur-bearing animal.

The rise in the price of the silver black fox for breeding purposes has been much greater than the rise in price of its pelt value. As given in "Fur Farming in Canada" the price of a pair of five months' old silver fox pups could be bought in September, 1909, for \$3,000. In September, 1913, the price had advanced to \$16,000, and his year they are held at about the same figure. The increase in proven breeders was even much greater, some having been sold as high as from \$25,000 to \$35,000 a pair.

So long as furs are procurable, just so long will they remain in fashion. They have stood the test for very many years, and it is safe to predict that the time will never arrive, when

DALHOUSIE TEAM WINS FROM ST. F. X.

HALIFAX, October 22.—In a game which was anybody's till the closing minutes of play, the game St. Francis Xavier football team went down to defeat by the narrow margin of eight points to nil. After holding their heavier opponents and forcing them to touch for safety three times, the Xavier fifteen were defeated by the brilliant work of George Campbell and Richmond which netted try number one and a fine exhibition of passing by the half line which sent Harley across.

There was a goodly crowd in attendance and the weather conditions were ideal. A. D. Campbell was the referee and handled the game in an indifferent manner.

The first time this season the big Tiger team showed real life. The scrum was strengthened by the addition of several new men and they played a rattling game from start to finish. The half line was brilliant when they got a chance which we have said before, was seldom. The oral weakness in the Dal team was the connecting link between the scrum and halves.

The quarters drew one man, and usually two, which made clean passing a difficulty. The new scrum formation introduced by Coach Dickie, proved to be successful and with a little polishing up should work like a machine.

The St. F. X. team put up a consistent game. Burchell in the forward line was in every play he worked like a Trojan, and put up a hard effective game. The half line tackled well. Trainer showed great ability in this line and together with Walsh McGillivray and Morrissey, nailed their men in the back.

The game taken as a whole was hard fought from start to finish, both teams never conceding an inch. The Dal victory may be attributed to heady football and excellent ball handling.

St. F. X. Kicked off to Dal who defended the east end of the Garrison field and after some loose dribbling, Burchell got away on a long dribble which caused Campbell to touch for safety after six minutes of play. From the drop end, the play remained near the back of the field, but in the St. F. X. quarters nailed Fraser and Graham in their tracks, and only small advances resulted. The Blue and White forwards worked well in the throws flipping the ball back to their halves for the kick. Campbell got the best of a winking duel by finding touch Dalhousie hives by dribbling and passing, carried the play to the visitors, five yard line, but St. F. X. cleared on McGillivray's long boot. ITALY REDUCES CEREAL DUTIES. ROME, ITALY, Oct. 22.—In view of the situation resulting from the war, King Emmanuel has issued a decree reducing the import duties on cereals during the period from Oct. 20 to Dec. 31, 1914. The reductions, which are based on the quintal (the equivalent of 220.4 pounds avoirdupois) will be as follows: Wheat from 50c. to 60c.; corn 23c. to 10c.; rye 30c. to 40c.; oats 30c. to 40c.; flour \$2.25 to \$1.05; and cornflour from 83c. to 20c.

Italy imports annually 6,000,000 tons of wheat, the greater portion coming from Russia and Roumania. About 43,000 tons of wheat is received yearly from the United States.

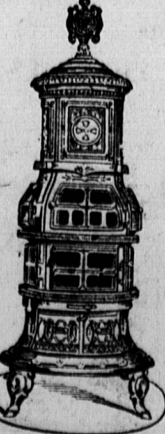
