In reply to Mr. Arsenault, the Premier stated that the sums received by the Government for these lands and interest thereon from the time received was \$10,488. The Chief Justice and the Attorney General for the time being and Mr. Justice Hodgson were the trustees. It is a perpetual trust.

The Examiner's report confirmed that of the Guardian as follows: "The Mathieson agreed that the People in Lot 67 must be protected and approved the course proposed by the leader of the Government."

The Resolution passed by unanimous vote of the House. It appears that the Speaker and one member at least of Mr. Hazard's Government took the opinion of counsel, and that as a consequence no Bill was introduced nor any further action taken by the Government of that time.

This was the last I heard of the case until August, 1912.

THE NEXT MOVE

A short time before the 26th day of August last, Mr. Gaudet, representing the estate of Lady Wood, called on me and introduced the question of settling this claim, when I stated my attitude in respect to it in substantially the same terms as when the Resolution was introduced in the House in 1911.

I have never taken any other position in relation to this claim than—(1) That the tenants who bought from the Government in good faith must be protected by the Government and (2), that the Government should pay to the persons entitled, compensation for the land in question.

STRANGE ACTION OF TRUSTEES

In this strange case there is nothing stranger than the action of the Trustees in relation to this Government. During the session of last year when we might have dealt effectively with the case we heard nothing from them, but in the midst of recess they suddenly fell upon us, when they well knew that we had not the power to comply with their demands.

On the 26th August, 1912, Mr. Gaudet wrote me as follows: "Hon. J. A. Mathieson, Premier and Attorney General, Charlottetown, P. E. I., Dear Sir:—Referring to the conversation which the writer had with you some time ago concerning the claim of the Trustees under the Marriage Settlement of Lady Louisa August Wood to certain farms of land situated on Township Number Sixty-seven and which were sold by the Commissioner of Public Lands to the tenants under the Leases from Lady Wood, and which Leases are still outstanding, I beg to say that I am instructed by the Trustees of the Marriage Settlement to take proceedings at once in order to enforce the payment of rent from the tenants."

I would, therefore, be extremely obliged if you would advise me whether it is the intention of your Government to protect the parties interested by making a settlement with the Trustees of Lady Wood, and also whether the matter has been brought before the notice of your Government and what action has been decided thereon.

I propose, in accordance with my instructions, to begin proceedings immediately after the present vacation, as there has already been considerable delay, and we do not think it advisable to grant any further extension of time unless we get a positive assurance that the matter will be settled. To this I replied as follows:

RE LADY WOOD ESTATE

Dear Sir:—I have before me your letter of the 26th instant concerning the claim of the Trustees under the Marriage Settlement of Lady Wood to certain lands on Lot 67, and you ask me to state the intention of the Government and what action it has decided upon in the premises.

In reply I beg to say that the matter has not as yet been considered by my Government. Any settlement agreed upon would require Legislative action to give it effect. I would suggest that the case be allowed to stand until the opening of the next Session of the Legislature, when, I give you the assurance, it will receive the most careful consideration. MR. GAUDET'S REPLY

Hon. J. A. Mathieson, Premier and Attorney General, Charlottetown, P. E. I.

Dear Sir:—I beg to advise that I have submitted your answer to my letter of August 26th to the Trustees of Lady Wood and they are not satisfied that it contains any assurance which would place the matter in any better position than it has been in since it was first mooted two or three years ago.

A NAVAL HOLIDAY IN SHIP BUILDING

(Continued from page nine) reinforcements would gradually be diminished. It behooves the overseas Dominions to make exertions for their own and the common security, whether by the provision of local navies, or by what is more effectual, making additions to the imperial navy which will preserve, restore or increase the world-wide mobility of its squadrons.

THE DOMINIONS MUST BE FREE

"It could not be supposed, however, that the naval development of the Dominions could be restricted on account of any European standard. They, too, like us, must be absolutely free. It is for them to choose the method of their naval development. It is also for them to choose whether their naval forces shall be additional to the British standard or whether they shall be a contribution to aid the heavy burdens of the British taxpayer. Therefore, we can answer regarding this false dilemma of dominion ships that they are additional to the requirements of the sixty per cent standard. They are not additional to the world-wide requirements of the British Empire."

Turning to the proposed Canadian ships, Mr. Churchill said: "While they will be directly controlled by the admiralty, we propose to form them, with the Malay and New Zealand ships, into a new squadron, of five ships of high uniform speed, to be called the Imperial squadron. It will be based at Gibraltar, and thence able to reach Halifax in five days, Quebec in six days, Jamaica in nine days, the South American coast in twelve days, Capetown in thirteen days, Alexandria in 23 days, Sydney in 28 days, New Zealand in thirty-two days, Hong Kong in 22 days and Vancouver in 23 days.

ON THE CANADIAN SHIPS

"Our intention is that this squadron shall, as opportunity serves, cruise freely about the empire, visiting the dominions, ready to operate at any threatened point at home or abroad. The dominions will be considered in all movements not dominated by military considerations.

"Special facilities will be given for Canadians, South Africans and New Zealanders to serve as men or officers in this squadron. In this way the true idea will be given of a mobile imperial squadron of the greatest strength and speed, patrolling the empire, showing the flag and bringing effective aid wherever needed.

IMPERIAL FEDERATION

"There is no more valuable principle than imperial federation and inter-dominion action. We cannot control these developments. Each dominion is absolutely free to take its own course. The admiralty will do its best to work loyally with the responsible ministers of any government that may come into power in any part of the empire. That is our duty.

"But it is also our duty, with our knowledge and experience in naval matters, to state clearly what we believe to be the right, sound plan for these important developments to follow, and to combine as far as possible what is best for each with what is best for all."

PROVIDING OIL FUEL

Mr. Churchill was convinced that the difficulties of oil fuel would be overcome. He referred to the evicton provision, dwelling upon the excellence of the British hydro-aeroplane and affirmed that the time had arrived to provide long range airships of the largest type. He proposed to enlist the services of some great manufacturing firm in the construction of rigid airships. Meanwhile he trusted there would be no silly panic. He announced that the admiralty had arranged to lead to first class British liners, guns, ammunition and trained gunners to enable them to protect commerce against armed foreign merchant steamers in time of war. He deplored the delay in sanctioning the Marconi contract.

Mr. Churchill concluded by desiring to explicitly repudiate the suggestion that Britain could ever afford to allow another naval power to approach so nearly as to be able to restrict her political action by purely naval pressure. Such a situation would unquestionably lead to war. A small margin of safety would involve a strain upon officers and men which would be intolerable.
