Special to The Guardian. LONDON, May 17—When six hundred scholars in the Rectory Street School had been seated at their studies, a fire broke out in the corridors. An alarm was given and within 45 seconds every child was safely outside the building.

The children acted like bricks, carrying out their fire drill in perfect order, although the corridors were filled with stifling smoke.

The damage was slight. PORTLAND, May 17—The Portland high school building, valued at \$100,000 was practically destroyed by fire today and many other structures were seriously threatened.

Fifteen minutes after the fire started in the basement it had burned up through four stories and broken through the roof.

NEW YORK, May 17—The heart of the hotel district had a bomb explosion today and two thousand frightened hotel guests choked the streets.


The explosion occurred in West 44th Street near Broadway and shattered a few windows without hurting anybody, but caused such consternation among the sleepers in the big hotels that police services had to be called out to quiet the excitement.

Special to The Guardian. JUAREZ, May 18—Francisco Madero has announced that the news from Mexico City was so entirely satisfactory it might be universally proclaimed that he really thought that Mexico's is now an accomplished feat.

Madero will act as chief adviser to the Minister of Foreign Relations, Labarro, who will become President ad interim. As the date for the withdrawal from office of President Diaz and the Vice President, has been definitely fixed for June 1, it will not be necessary for the Insurrectos to institute a provisional Government for the intervening few days.

The fact that Madero will act with Labarro will be a sufficient guarantee of the success of the revolution. Diaz's announcement of his intention to resign is accepted with absolute faith by the rebels.
