did most to bring the United States into the war. In the present conflict Germany would treat neutral ships with more respect if the United States were likely to be offended as it is, however, the neutrals which are hurt by submarine sinkings are small and unable to retaliate.

### Daily War Survey

(By The Canadian Press)

Recent announcement from Berlin, coupled with the performance of German submarines confirms the expectation that the Nazis will use submarine warfare to the utmost possible against Allied ships and the ships of neutral countries frequenting Allied ports.

It still is difficult to forecast the course of German campaigns on land but on the sea the course becomes clear.

This is in accord with one of the lessons drawn from the First Great War when many authorities agreed, Germany might have succeeded with unrestricted submarine warfare had it been started earlier and carried on without interruption.

The submarine activity also fits in with the German plan of applying pressure to the small neutral states in order to force them economic satellites of the Reich. Every neutral ship sunk makes trade relations with Great Britain look more precarious to the neutrals and makes trade with Germany a little more desirable.

The United States neutrality law is rather a convenience for the Germans in one respect, however much it may injure them in others, American ships are prohibited from entering the war zone and thus the one big neutral maritime power is not likely to be directly affected by the submarines.
